GOVERNMENT GRANTS CHILDREN

Grants to Tribes, Tribal Organizations, and Migrant Programs for Community-Based Child Abuse Prevention Programs

*US Department of Health & Human Services,
Administration on Children, Youth & Families, Children's Bureau*

Program: The purpose of this funding announcement is to provide financial support to selected Tribes, Tribal Organizations, and migrant programs to prevent the occurrence or recurrence of abuse or neglect within the Tribal and migrant populations. The funds are to support more effective and comprehensive child abuse prevention activities and family support services, including an emphasis on strengthening marriages and reaching out to include fathers, that will enhance the lives and ensure the safety and well-being of migrant and Native American children and their families.

Award: Total available funding: \$416,889; up to 3 grants at \$138,963 each

Eligibility: Indian/Native American Tribal governments (Federally recognized), Indian/Native American Tribally Designated Organizations, non-profits with 501(c)(3) IRS status (other than institutions of higher education), non-profits without 501(c)(3) IRS status (other than institutions of higher education)

Standing Announcement for Unaccompanied Alien Children

US Department of Health & Human Services, Office of Refugee Resettlement (ORR)

Program: This program provides the opportunity to fund providers for basic shelter and/or group homes and more specialized types of care. The two priority areas for funding are: **Priority Area 1** - Mega Grants: large national networks and/or entities that partner to build an infrastructure made up of multiple facilities and locations (in multiple states) that can accommodate fluctuations in bed capacity and **Priority Area 2** - Micro Grants: made up of individual shelter facilities or partnerships between two entities in a local geographic area.

Award: Priority Area 1: Total available funding: \$30 million; 1 to 4 awards averaging \$2,550,000 each; **Priority Area 2:** Total available funding: \$5 million; 1 to 4 awards averaging \$2,550,000 each

Eligibility: Priority Area 1 & 2: Non-profit organizations (including faith-based and community organizations) and for-profit organizations are eligible to apply

REFUGEE COMMUNITY**Wilson/Fish Alternative Program**

US Department of Health & Human Services, Office of Refugee Resettlement (ORR)

Program: This program is an alternative to the traditional State administered refugee resettlement program for providing assistance (cash and medical) and social services to refugees. It is to increase refugee prospects for early employment and self-sufficiency, promote coordination among voluntary resettlement agencies and service provider and ensure that refugee assistance programs exist in every State where refugees are resettled.

Award: Total available funding: \$23 million; 12 to 15 grants averaging \$1.8 million each

Eligibility: Public and private non-profit organizations, including faith-based and community organizations

Deadline: April 30, 2008; April 30, 2009; April 30, 2010

SUICIDE PREVENTION**Cooperative Agreements for State-Sponsored Youth Suicide Prevention and Early Intervention**

*US Department of Health & Human Services,
Substance Abuse & Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA)*

Program: The purpose of this program is to build on the foundation of prior suicide prevention efforts in order to support States and tribes in developing and implementing statewide or tribal youth suicide prevention and early intervention strategies, grounded in public/private collaboration.

Award: Total available funding: \$9 million; up to 18 awards at up to \$500,000 each

Eligibility: States; federally recognized Indian tribes, tribal organizations or urban Indian organizations that are actively involved in the development and continuation of a tribal youth suicide early intervention and prevention strategy; public or private non-profit organizations designated by a State, federally recognized Indian tribe, tribal organization, or urban Indian organization, to develop or direct the State/tribal-sponsored youth suicide prevention and early intervention strategy

Deadline: April 22, 2008

Avon Foundation

Program: The Foundation's 2008 Domestic Violence Children's Program will provide grants to innovative coordinated response models developed by domestic violence organizations and organizations that assist child victims of abuse or child witnesses of domestic violence. Applying organizations should offer family support and parent education services to both the children and the non-offending adult caregiver.

Award: Grant amounts range from \$10,000 - \$50,000 depending on the size, scope and impact of the program proposed. Grants are non-renewable.

Eligibility: Non-profit 501(c)(3) organizations that have demonstrated experience assisting domestic violence victims and are developing or expanding a collaborative model to provide therapeutic services to child victims

Deadline: March 31, 2008

TEEN DATING AND SEXUAL VIOLENCE**Building Healthy Teen Relationships**

Robert Wood Johnson Foundation

Program: This program will support the creation and evaluation of comprehensive community-based models of prevention that aim to decrease relationship violence and increase positive protective relationship skills.

Award: Approximately 8 grants at up to \$250,000 each per year, with a maximum award of \$1 million for the full grant period

Eligibility: 501(c)(3) nonprofit organizations, public entities

Program: The Rosenberg Fund for Children provides for the educational and emotional needs of children of targeted progressive activists, and youth who are targeted activists themselves. Subject to financial ability, the RFC will fund such things as: school tuition; camp tuition; counseling; cultural lessons; recreational programs; and after-school programs.

Award: Up to \$3,000 per child/youth (\$2,000 limit per cycle) annually. This is open to the children of targeted activists and to targeted activist youth.

Eligibility: This granting program is open to the children of targeted activists and to targeted activist youth age 18 and younger.

Deadline: Spring Deadline: March 21, 2008; Fall Deadline: October 13, 2008

Rosenberg Fund for Children – Carry It Forward Awards (CIF)*Rosenberg Foundation, Inc.*

Program: The Rosenberg Fund for Children provides for the educational and emotional needs of children of targeted progressive activists, and youth who are targeted activists themselves. The Carry It Forward Awards program provides \$600 per year to beneficiaries aged 19 through 24 to help with the cost of books and supplies associated with post-high school education and training.

Award: Once a year award of \$600 for books and supplies

Eligibility: This is open to the children of targeted activists and to targeted activist youth ages 19 through 24.

Program: The Rosenberg Fund for Children provides for the educational and emotional needs of children of targeted progressive activists, and youth who are targeted activists themselves. The Special Travel program is a one-time only award made to beneficiaries aged 19 through 24 to help cover the costs of travel that serves an educational or therapeutic purpose. The grant can either be paid directly to a provider or institution (such as a school or travel agent) or beneficiaries may submit receipts to the RFC for reimbursement of expenses such as airline tickets or other transportation costs.

Award: One-time-only award of up to \$2,500

Eligibility: This is open to the children of targeted activists and to targeted activist youth ages 19 through 24.

Deadline: Spring Deadline: March 21, 2008; Autumn Deadline: October 13, 2008

Rosenberg Fund for Children – Attica Fund Prison Visit Program*Rosenberg Foundation, Inc.*

Program: The Rosenberg Fund for Children provides for the educational and emotional needs of children of targeted progressive activists, and youth who are targeted activists themselves. The Attica Fund Prison Visit program provides funds (over and above the amount available for our Regular Granting, CIF or Special Travel programs) for children and youth up to age 24 to visit activist parents from whom they have been separated because the activist parent(s) has been imprisoned.

Award: Once a year award with a \$2,000 per family annual limit, for no more than three visits per year

Eligibility: This is open to the children of targeted activists ages 19 through 24.

Deadline: Spring Deadline: March 21, 2008; Autumn Deadline: October 13, 2008

Program: The Reclaiming Futures Model will be spread to additional communities through a learning collaborative that shares resources, improves data collection and utilization, and promotes new standards of practice.

Award: No grant funds will be awarded as part of this initiative. Up to six communities will be selected as Reclaiming Futures sites in 2008. Each site will receive a package of technical assistance, including participation in fellowships that exchange information and ideas and coaching via conference calls and national meetings. Depending on the number of participating communities the estimated value of services provided by Reclaiming Futures is up to \$180,000 per site. Communities must match this support by hiring and funding a half-time project director.

Program: The Falk Foundation supports proposals for examining the root causes of injustice through academic research, educating the public and policymakers about equity issues, designing approaches for the prevention of injustice, and implementing practices that promote equal access and opportunity. The Innovation and Development Grants are small flexible grants that are intended to be highly responsive to current events and provide seed funding for short-term activities.

Award: Up to \$2,500

Program: The Falk Foundation supports proposals for examining the root causes of injustice through academic research, educating the public and policymakers about equity issues, designing approaches for the prevention of injustice, and implementing practices that promote equal access and opportunity. Grant requests submitted from outside the region must be national in scope and impact and address public policies or practices that specifically affect African-American communities.

Award: Typical grant awards range up to \$75,000 per year
