AMERICAN RECOVERY AND REINVESTMENT ACT

OWW Recovery Act Transitional Housing Assistance Grants for Victims of Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, Stalking, or Sexual Assault

US Department of Justice, Office on Violence Against Women

Program: The awards from this program will increase the availability of transitional housing and related support services for victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking.

Award: Up to \$500,000

Eligibility: States, units of local government, Native American/Alaska Native tribes, Other organizations, including domestic violence and sexual assault victim service providers, domestic violence and sexual assault coalitions, other nonprofit, nongovernmental organizations, faith-based and community organizations, and culturally specific organizations, that have a documented history of effective work concerning domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, or stalking

Rigorous Evaluations of Existing Child Abuse Prevention Programs Grant

US Department of Health and Human Services,
Administration for Children and Families

Program: The purpose of this program is to encourage and support improvement in the quality of child abuse prevention programs by providing funding for evaluations of existing programs that have not previously been evaluated.

Award: Total available funding: \$600,000; 3 awards at \$200,000 each

Eligibility: State, county and local governments, Indian/Native American Tribal governments (Federally recognized), Indian/Native American Tribally Designated Organizations, public and state-controlled institutions of higher education, non-profits with and without 501(c)(3) IRS status (other than institutions of higher education), private institutions of higher education, for-profit organizations (other than small businesses) and small businesses

Program: The purpose of this program is to establish a National Resource Center for In-Home Services (NRCIHS). NRCIHS, as part of the Children's Bureau's Child Welfare Training and Technical Assistance Network (T/TA Network), will provide T/TA regarding effective and promising alternatives to out-of-home care and will build the capacity of State, local, and Tribal systems to provide services that will ensure the safety and well-being of children and youth in their homes while preserving, supporting, and stabilizing families.

Award: 1 award at \$950,000 per budget period

Eligibility: State, county, city or township governments, special district governments public and state controlled institutions of higher education, nonprofits with and without 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education, private institutions of higher education, for profit organizations other than small businesses, small businesses

National Resource Center for Tribes

*US Department of Health and Human Services,
Administration for Children and Families*

Program: The purpose of this program is to establish a National Resource Center for Tribes. NRCT, as part of the Children's Bureau's Child Welfare Training and Technical Assistance Network (T/TA Network), will function as a case manager in receiving T/TA requests from Tribes and coordinates with the T/TA Network to provide coordinated and culturally competent T/TA. The center is intended to successfully engage Tribes, to enhance their access to and utilization of the T/TA Network, to facilitate peer-to-peer consultation between Tribes regarding child welfare issues, and to increase cultural competence and sensitivity to Tribal voices in the T/TA Network.

Award: 1 award for \$875,000

Eligibility: Public and state controlled institutions of higher education, nonprofits with and without 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education, Native American tribal governments (Federally recognized), Native American tribal organizations (other than Federally recognized tribal governments), private institutions of higher education, for profit organizations other than small businesses, small businesses

CHILDREN & YOUTH**National Resource Center for Child Welfare Legal and Judicial Issues**
*US Department of Health and Human Services,
Administration for Children and Families*

Program: The purpose of this program is to establish a National Resource Center for Child Welfare Legal and Judicial Issues (NRCLJI) which will provide expertise to State and Tribal agencies and courts on legal and judicial aspects of child welfare practice. Areas of focus include permanency decision-making, adherence to ASFA and other Federal laws, the court's role in the CFSRs and child welfare reform, high quality legal representation for all parties, judicial and attorney workloads, quality assurance for courts and legal offices, effective forensic performance by agencies, the impact of ASFA on youth in the juvenile justice system, education needs of children and youth in foster care, legal ethics, and the interplay of domestic violence and child welfare.

Award: 1 award for \$1,150,000

Eligibility: State, county, city or township governments, special district governments, public and state controlled institutions of higher education, nonprofits with and without 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education, private institutions of higher education, for profit organizations other than small businesses, small businesses

REFUGEE COMMUNITY**Services for Survivors of Torture Program:
Technical Assistance to Organizations and Institutions
Providing Direct Services to Torture Survivors**

US Department of Health and Human Services, Office of Refugee Resettlement

Program: The purpose is to provide training and technical assistance to increase the capacity of programs to provide effective services to torture survivors and to measure their results. Collaboration should be evident among torture survivor programs and other relevant providers to develop increased capacity, expertise and skills to serve torture survivors through the facilitation of consultation, peer support and training across programs, identifying and promoting effective treatment strategies and resources, and fostering organizational stability and a sustainable set of services.

Award: Total available funding: \$875,000; 2 awards averaging \$370,000 each

Eligibility: Open to all types of domestic applicants other than individuals

Program: The purpose of this program is to provide services to torture survivors to enable them to regain their health and independence and rebuild productive lives. It is also to conduct training to improve services and care for torture survivors.

Award: Total available funding: \$8,700,000; 25 awards averaging \$380,000 each

Eligibility: Open to all types of domestic applicants including faith-based and community organizations

Program: The purpose of this program is to assist refugees in becoming economically self-sufficient, to help refugee communities in developing employment and capital resources, and to enhance the integration of refugees into the mainstream by helping mainstream organizations develop the experience of serving refugee populations.

Award: Total available funding: \$1.5 million; 8 awards averaging \$200,000 each

Eligibility: State, county, local, city or township governments, public and state-controlled Institutions of higher education, non-profits with and without 501(c)(3) IRS status (other than institutions of higher education), private institutions of higher education or faith-based or community based organizations

Program: The purpose of this program is to provide technical assistance to refugee-serving agencies, with the overall goal of improving the quality of services to refugees and aiding in refugees' and other ORR-eligible populations' long-term integration in the United States.

Award: Total available funding: \$2,842,649; 10 awards averaging \$250,000 each

Eligibility: Public or private nonprofit agencies, including faith-based and community organizations with prior experience or a demonstrated capacity to provide technical assistance to refugee-serving agencies

ECONOMICS**Community Economic Development Projects**

US Department of Health and Human Services, Office of Community Services

Program: The purpose of this program is to help Community Development Corporations, CDCs, alone or in partnership with third-party partners, create business development and expansion opportunities that will address the economic needs of low-income individuals through the creation of employment and business opportunities in low-income communities.

Award: Total available funding: \$29,100,000; 47 awards averaging \$619,148 each

Eligibility: Applicants must be private, non-profit CDC with 501(c)(3) IRS status experienced in planning, developing, or managing low-income housing or community development activities. For purposes of this grant program, a Board of Directors consisting of residents of the community and business and civic leaders must govern the CDC. The CDC must have as a principal purpose: planning, developing, or managing low-income housing or community development activities

PRISONER REENTRY**Second Chance Act Prisoner Reentry Initiative
FY 2009 Competitive Grant Announcement**
US Department of Justice, Bureau of Justice Assistance

Program: This program will provide grants to states, local governments, and tribes that may be used to promote the safe and successful reintegration into the community of individuals who have been incarcerated. Allowable uses of funds include mentorship, housing, education and job training, engagement with community colleges, family programming, initiatives addressing victim priorities and restorative justice, research to improve the effectiveness of release and revocation decisions using risk assessment tools, and reentry court programs.

Award: Awards of up to \$750,000; (Funding is contingent on the availability of funds and the number of offenders projected to be served)

Eligibility: State and local government agencies and federally recognized Native American Tribes, Alaska Native Tribes and Tribal Organizations

SUBSTANCE ABUSE/MENTAL HEALTH TREATMENT**Development of Comprehensive Drug/Alcohol and Mental Health Treatment Systems for Persons Who are Homeless**
*Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA),
Center for Substance Abuse Treatment (CSAT)*

Program: This program provides funds to expand and strengthen treatment services for persons who are homeless, who also have substance use disorders, mental disorders, or co-occurring substance use and mental disorders. The primary goal is to link treatment services with housing programs and other services. There are two categories of funding in FY 2009: **General** and **Services in Supportive Housing**. Under a **General** grant, funds may be used for services and populations of focus selected by the applicant based on local needs and resources. **Services in Supportive Housing** grant combines housing assistance and intensive individualized support services to chronically homeless individuals with substance use disorders, mental disorders, or co-occurring substance use and mental disorders.

Award: Total available funding: \$11.3 million; **General grants**-up to 20; **Services in Supportive Housing grants**-up to 13; Award amount for each type of grant-up to \$350,000 per year

Eligibility: Domestic community-based public and private nonprofit entities

NATIVE COMMUNITIES**National Resource Centers on Older Indians,
Alaska Natives & Native Hawaiians**

US Department of Health and Human Services, US Administration on Aging

Program: The primary goal of these centers is to enhance knowledge about older Native Americans and thereby to increase and improve the delivery of services to them. Applicants must specify at least two areas of primary concern on which the center will focus. These areas include: health issues; long-term care, including in-home care; elder abuse; and other problems and issues facing Native communities.

Award: Total available funding: \$672,000; 4 awards at up to \$350,000 each

Eligibility: Institutions of higher education are eligible to apply. Applicants must have experience conducting research, assessing the needs of older individuals and developing best practices to be utilized by the Tribes. Current Resource Centers are also eligible to apply.

PRIVATE GRANTS**VULNERABLE POPULATIONS-HEALTH OUTCOMES****Peaceful Pathways: Reducing Exposure to Violence**

Robert Wood Johnson Foundation Local Funding Partnerships

Program: The purpose of this program is to fund projects to reduce violence in specific communities such as those defined by race, ethnicity, tribe, gender, sexual identity or rural/frontier location.

Award: Total available funding: up to \$1 million; up to 8 matching grants of between \$50,000 to \$200,000 each

Eligibility: Projects must be new, community-based and culturally appropriate, reflecting how language skills, significant cultural differences, education, income and discrimination affect health outcomes. Community members should be engaged in planning and leadership. A diversity-focused funder that is principally concerned with the population to be served and nonprofit applicant 501(c) (3) organizations must nominate applicants
