## GOVERNMENT GRANTS

### CHILDREN & YOUTH

#### OJJDP FY 09 Tribal Youth Program

*US Department of Justice, Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention*

**Program:** Tribal Youth Program (TYP) supports and enhances tribal efforts to prevent and control delinquency and strengthen the juvenile justice system for American Indian/Alaska Native (AI/AN) youth.

**Award:** Awards are population based: Tribes with 1,500 or fewer residents located on or near the reservation may apply for one 4-year award of up to \$250,000; Tribes with 1,501 to 6,000 residents located on or near the reservation may apply for one 4-year award of up to \$350,000; Tribes with 6,001 or more residents located on or near the reservation may apply for one 4-year award of up to \$450,000

**Eligibility:** Federally-recognized Native American tribes who will not have an active TYP award on October 1, 2009

#### National Resource Center for Community-Based Child Abuse Prevention (NRCCBCAP)

*US Department of Health & Human Services, Administration for Children & Families*

**Program:** The Resource Center will be the primary provider of T/TA to build the capacity of Community-Based Child Abuse Prevention (CBCAP) lead agencies and their partners in the planning and development of a network of interdisciplinary community-based programs and activities designed to strengthen and support families to prevent child abuse and neglect. It will also promote stronger linkages with the child welfare and other child and family systems.

**Award:** One award at \$1.4 million

**Eligibility:** Public and State controlled institutions of higher education, nonprofits both with and without 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education, private institutions of higher education, for profit organizations other than small businesses

**Program:** The purpose of the National Child Traumatic Stress Initiative grant program is to improve treatment and services for children and adolescents who have experienced traumatic events and to increase access to these treatments and services throughout the United States. The role of the National Center for Child Traumatic Stress (NCCTS) is to provide leadership, infrastructure, and support for the Network to achieve its goals of increasing access and raising the standard of care for traumatized children, adolescents, and their families.

**Award:** 1 award at \$5 million

**Program:** The purpose of this program is to improve treatment and services for children and adolescents in the United States who have experienced traumatic events. The initiative is designed to address child trauma issues by creating a national network of grantees—the National Child Traumatic Stress Network—that work collaboratively to develop and promote effective community practices for children and adolescents exposed to a wide array of traumatic events.

**Award:** Total available funding: \$10.4 million; 26 awards at a maximum of \$400,000 per year

**CHILDREN & YOUTH****National Child Traumatic Stress Initiative Category II  
Treatment and Services Adaptation Centers**

*US Department of Health & Human Services,  
Substance Abuse & Mental Health Services Administration*

**Program:** The purpose of this program is to provide national expertise on specific types of traumatic events, population groups, and service systems and support the specialized adaptation of effective treatment and service approaches for communities across the country thereby improving treatment and services for children and adolescents in the United States who have experienced traumatic events. The initiative is designed to address child trauma issues by creating a national network of grantees—the National Child Traumatic Stress Network—that work collaboratively to develop and promote effective community practices for children and adolescents exposed to a wide array of traumatic events.

**Award:** Total available funding: \$4.8 million; 8 awards at a maximum of \$600,000 per year

**ECONOMICS****Job Opportunities for Low-Income Individuals (JOLI)**

*US Department of Health and Human Services, Office of Community Services (OCS)*

**Program:** The JOLI program supports business development and expansion opportunities, including micro-enterprise and self-employment opportunities, in an effort to help Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) recipients and other low-income individuals achieve economic self-sufficiency. Grantees may provide technical and financial assistance to private employers in low-income communities in order to create sustainable employment and business opportunities.

**Award:** Total available funding: \$4,838,000; 11 grants averaging \$439,818 per project period

**Eligibility:** Nonprofits with 501(c)(3) or 501(c)(4) status

***ECONOMICS*****Recovery Act: Edward Byrne Memorial Competitive Grant Program**

*US Department of Justice, Bureau of Justice Assistance*

**Program:** This competitive grant announcement focuses on initiatives in eight areas: preventing and reducing violent crime through community-based data-driven approaches; providing funding for neighborhood-based probation and parole officers; reducing mortgage fraud and crime related to vacant properties; hiring of civilian support personnel in law enforcement (training staff, analysts, dispatchers, etc.); enhancing forensic and crime scene investigations; improving resources and services for victims of crime; supporting problem-solving courts; and national training and technical assistance partnerships.

**Award:** No specific funding amounts are assigned per category. Depending on the number of successful applications received in each category, grant funds will be distributed as appropriate. Categories I-VII have no minimum/maximum funding amounts in the Byrne Competitive Program. In order to be competitive, applicants should support the amount of federal funds requested by tying the requested amount directly to the scope of the unmet need, the planned project activities, and the agency's capacity to perform. Category VIII: Training and Technical Assistance Partnerships in support of state administrative agencies, does have a maximum funding amount of \$1 million. Other training and technical assistance projects under Category VIII have no minimum/maximum funding amounts.

**Eligibility:** National, regional, state, and local public and private entities, including for-profit (commercial) and nonprofit organizations, faith-based and community organizations, institutions of higher education, tribal jurisdictions, and units of local government to improve the functioning of the criminal justice system, provide assistance to victims of crime (other than compensation)

***VICTIMS OF CRIME*****FY 2009 Tribal Victim Assistance Training and Technical Assistance**

*US Department of Justice, Office for Victims of Crime*

**Program:** The purpose of this program is to provide comprehensive, skills-building training and technical assistance to grantees that have received funding under the FY 2009 Tribal Victim Assistance Discretionary Grant Program.

**Award:** One award for \$500,000

**Eligibility:** Eligible applicants must have experience working with American Indian and Alaska Native communities, including tribal commercial and nonprofit organizations, tribal colleges and universities, and tribal consortiums.

**VICTIMS OF CRIME****FY2009 Tribal Victim Assistance Discretionary Grant Program**

*US Department of Justice, Office for Victims of Crime*

**Program:** This program provides funding to plan, implement, and/or enhance the ability of tribal victim assistance programs to support American Indian/Alaska Native (AI/AN) communities to improve their ability to identify the needs of crime victims and the types of victimization on which to focus; provide direct services to victims of crime; and address the needs of un-served and underserved victims, particularly those victimized by crimes such as child abuse, homicide, elder abuse, driving while intoxicated (DWI), and gang violence.

**Award:** Total available funding: \$3 million; 20-25, 12 month awards with a maximum of \$150,000

**Eligibility:** Federally recognized tribal governments, for-profit (commercial) organizations, nonprofit organizations, faith-based and community organizations, institutions of higher learning, and consortiums with demonstrated organization and community-based experience working with American Indian and Alaska Native communities, including tribal commercial and nonprofit organizations, tribal colleges and universities, and tribal consortiums.

**HOMELESSNESS****Development of Comprehensive Drug/Alcohol and Mental Health Treatment Systems for Persons Who are Homeless**

*US Department of Health & Human Services,  
Substance Abuse & Mental Health Services Administration*

**Program:** The purpose of this program is to expand and strengthen treatment services for persons who are homeless (including those who are chronically homeless), who also have substance use disorders, mental disorders, or co-occurring substance use and mental disorders. Funds are available for grants in two categories: "General" and "Services in Supportive Housing."

**Award:** Total available funding: \$11.3 million; awards: Treatment for Homeless-General-up to 20; Treatment for Homeless-Services in Supportive Housing-up to 13; award amount: up to \$350,000 per year

**Eligibility:** Domestic community-based public and private nonprofit entities

***SUBSTANCE ABUSE PREVENTION*****Sober Truth on Preventing Underage Drinking Act Grants**

*US Department of Health & Human Services,  
Substance Abuse & Mental Health Services Administration*

**Program:** The purpose of this program is to prevent and reduce alcohol use among youth in communities throughout the United States. Grantees are to focus on environmental strategies for preventing and reducing underage drinking, and grantees and coalition member organizations should continue to seek other funding sources to implement individual (non-environmental) change strategies that are a part of a comprehensive community plan.

**Award:** Total available funding: \$1 million; 20 awards up to \$50,000 each

**Eligibility:** Domestic public and private nonprofit entities that are currently grantee organizations receiving or having received grant funds under the Drug-Free Communities Program (DFC)

***INTERPERSONAL VIOLENCE*****National Violent Death Reporting System (NVDRS)**

*Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC),  
National Center for Injury Prevention and Control*

**Program:** NVDRS has four main objectives: to link records on violent deaths that occurred in the same incident to help identify risk factors for multiple homicides or homicides-suicides, provide timely preliminary information on violent deaths through faster data retrieval-currently, vital statistics data are not available until two years after a death, describe in detail the circumstances that may have contributed to a violent death, and better characterize perpetrators, including their relationships to victim(s).

**Award:** Total available fiscal year funding: \$876,625; 4 awards averaging \$219,000 each

**Eligibility:** Federally recognized or state-recognized Native American/Alaska Native tribal governments, state and local governments or their Bona Fide Agents

**SEXUAL ASSAULT-CONFERENCES****OVC FY09 SART Conference 2011**

*US Department of Justice, Office for Victims of Crime*

**Program:** this cooperative agreement will fund the planning and implementation of the 2011 SART Conference. The 2011 SART conference will provide 2.5–3 days of state-of-the-art training for SART professionals including victim advocates, sexual assault nurse examiners (SANEs) and other medical personnel, law enforcement, prosecutors, and crime lab specialists. National experts in the five SART disciplines will present workshops and keynotes at the conference on a multidisciplinary, victim-centered approach to sexual assault to improve responses to sexual assault victims.

**Award:** One award for \$500,000

**Eligibility:** Private nonprofit organizations, including faith-based and community-based organizations, colleges or universities, public agencies or tribal organizations, and governments that can demonstrate knowledge and understanding of sexual assault and a sexual assault response team (SART); and staff resources and capability to plan and implement a national training conference for approximately 1,000 SART professionals. A private nonprofit organization does not have to have 501(c)(3) status to apply for grant funding under this solicitation.

**Program:** This program aims to encourage the transfer of psychological science with regard to violence, its prevention, and intervention strategies to applications within the community, and also to support the implementation of innovative community programs aimed at preventing violence. APF will consider requests for seed money to establish promising interventions proposed by community-based organizations or to provide funding for established community programs that have been deemed successful.

**Award:** Awards of up to \$20,000 each

**Eligibility:** 501(c)(3) nonprofit organizations or educational institutions or affiliated with such an organization

***VIOLENCE PREVENTION*****A Brighter Future for Children and Youth: 2009-2012**

*General Board of Global Ministries, Women's Division*

**Program:** This program provides grants for projects and programs that address the needs of children and young people between the ages of 5 and 18 in the areas of violence prevention, anti-abuse, and relationship abuse.

**Award:** Grants of up to \$4,000 with the average grant of \$2,500; approximately 10% of the applicants receive funding each year

**Eligibility:** This is a one-time grant. New or existing projects are eligible to apply. Preference will be given to projects that significantly involve women and youth at the grassroots level, demonstrate the ability to raise additional funds from other sources, provide direct and comprehensive services to young people, promote respect for racial and ethnic diversity, and cultivate spiritual lives and values.

**Family Violence Prevention Grants**

*Target Foundation*

**Program:** Family Violence Prevention Grants support programs that strengthen families and communities by keeping them safe. Target store grants support nonprofit programs that help prevent family violence, such as parenting classes and family counseling. Grants may also provide assistance for support groups and abuse shelters.

**Award:** Most grants average between \$1,000 and \$3,000 each.

**Eligibility:** Applicants may be 501(c)(3) organizations or schools, libraries, or public agencies.

**RESEARCH****Public Health Law Research***Robert Wood Johnson Foundation*

**Program:** This is a national initiative to build the evidence for and strengthen the use of effective regulatory, legal and policy solutions to improve public health. Two types of studies will be funded: short-term studies that include legal research, policy analysis or public health implications of specific laws or regulations and complex and comprehensive legal and public health studies that include long-term multi-state analyses and other in-depth evaluations of laws will be funded.

**Award:** Total available funding: \$3.5 million; short-term studies: up to \$150,000 for up to 18 months and complex and comprehensive legal and public health: up to \$400,000 for up to 30 months each
