Community Services Block Grant Training and Technical Assistance Program: Capacity-Building for Ongoing CSBG Programs and Strategic Planning and Coordination Supported by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009

US Department of Health & Human Services,
Administration for Children and Families (ACF),
Office of Community Services (OCS)

Program: The purpose of the grant is to fund up to 48 statewide capacity-building collaborations focused on two areas: capacity-building for ongoing CSBG programs and strategic planning and coordination supported by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009. The funds will be used to provide training and technical assistance on improving program quality (including financial management), management information and reporting systems, measurement of program results, and responsiveness to identified local needs. The important technical assistance needs include statewide efforts designed to ensure coordination of Community Action Program Recovery Act projects, inform communities of available services, document community results and prepare communities to sustain the impact of Recovery Act funds.

Award: Total available funding: \$5,040,000; 96 awards with the average projected award amount of \$105,000 per budget period

Eligibility: Non-profits with 501(c)(3) IRS status (other than institutions of higher education), Non-profits without 501(c)(3) IRS status (other than institutions of higher education)

and E-Learning Community of Practice**

Part A of this solicitation represents continuation funding for NRCDV/VAWnet, the national on-line project of NRCDV, and we intend to apply.

CalCasa/Prevention Connection is the current recipient of Part B of this RFA, and also intends to apply.

Program: The program supports online resources and professional training for practitioners working to prevent intimate partner violence (IPV) and sexual violence (SV). The goals are to increase knowledge about the primary prevention of IPV and SV and to build capacity among local, state, tribal and national agencies and organizations to develop, implement and evaluate IPV and SV prevention programs. The program builds on previous efforts to enhance practitioners' ability to address IPV and SV using a public health approach.

Award: Total available funding: \$2,190,000 for 3 years; current fiscal year funding: \$730,000; one award for Part A and one award for Part B; approximate average award: Part A: \$315,000; Part B: \$415,000

Eligibility: Governments, institutions of higher education, nonprofits and for-profits, including small businesses

RURAL COMMUNITIES-TELECOMMUNICATIONS**Rural Development Community Connect Grant Program**

US Department of Agriculture, Rural Utilities Service

Program: The Community Connect program serves rural communities where broadband service is least likely to be available, but where it can make a tremendous difference in the quality of life for citizens. The projects funded by these grants will help rural residents tap into the enormous potential of the internet. The grants may be used to deploy broadband transmission service to residents, businesses and critical community facilities such as police and first responders. They may be used to construct and operate community centers that provide free broadband access to community residents, too.

Award: \$13.4 million for awards ranging from \$50,000 to \$1 million

Eligibility: Governments, nonprofits and for-profits, including small businesses

CHILDREN & YOUTH**Mentoring Children of Prisoners (MCP)**

US Department of Health & Human Services, Family & Youth Services Bureau

Program: The MCP program is designed to be a community-based mentoring program in which children and youth ages four up to age 18, are appropriately matched with an adult mentor, who has been screened and trained, for a one-on-one (one mentor/one youth), friendship-oriented (non curriculum-based) mentoring relationship.

Award: Total available funding: \$9 million; 70 awards averaging \$211,163 each

Eligibility: Nonprofits, institutions of higher education, governments

Street Outreach Program

US Department of Health & Human Services, Family & Youth Services Bureau

Program: The purpose of the SOP is to conduct outreach services designed to build relationships between grantee staff and runaway, homeless, and street youth. The services must address the behavioral and physical health of youth, employment and educational supports, reunification with family and alternative, safe placements.

Award: Total available funding: \$5 million; 50 awards averaging \$100,000 each

Eligibility: State, county, local, city or township governments, regional organizations, Indian/Native American Tribal governments (Federally recognized), Indian/Native American Tribal organizations (other than Federally recognized), Indian/Native American tribally designated organizations, Public/Native American housing authorities, non-profits with 501(c)(3) IRS status (other than institutions of higher education), non-profits without 501(c)(3) IRS status (other than institutions of higher education), special district governments, nonprofit private agencies for sexual abuse prevention programs Governments, institutions of higher education, nonprofits and for-profits, including small businesses

for Child Abuse Professionals**

Program: This program will provide funding for the development and implementation of a model technical assistance and training program for child abuse professionals and to improve the judicial system's handling of child abuse and neglect cases. The purpose of this program is to improve the coordinated multidisciplinary investigation and response to child abuse.

Award: One award for up to \$300,000 per year, not to exceed 5 years

Eligibility: National organizations including public agencies (including state agencies, units of local government) public universities and colleges, and tribal governments, and private organizations (including faith-based and community organizations).

**OJJDP FY 09 VOCA Children's Advocacy
Centers Subgrant Program**

Program: This program will provide funding to manage a national grant awards program for local children's advocacy center programs. Children's Advocacy Centers provide a coordinated response to victims of child abuse through multidisciplinary teams composed of representatives from the statutorily mandated and other involved agencies.

Award: One award of up to \$12 million for a 1-year period renewable for a period not to exceed 3 years

Eligibility: Public agencies (including state agencies, units of local government, public universities and colleges, and federally-recognized Indian tribal governments) and private organizations (including faith-based, tribal and community organizations).

Award: One award for up to \$1.7 million per year, renewable for a period not to exceed 5 years

Eligibility: Public agencies (including state agencies, units of local government, public universities and colleges, and federally-recognized Indian tribal governments), and private organizations (including faith-based, tribal and community organizations).

RESEARCH**Research on Teen Dating Violence**

Centers for Disease Control & Prevention, National Institute of Health (NIH)

Program: Research is sought that examines the linkages and gaps among perceptions of appropriate responses to teen dating violence from service providers, the criminal justice system, teens themselves, victims, perpetrators and bystanders. NIH encourages investigator-initiated research grant applications from institutions/ organizations that propose to conduct behavioral and/or biomedical research aimed at better understanding the etiologies and precursors for, reducing risk for, and incidence of, teen dating violence. Research is also sought that examines the linkages and gaps among perceptions of appropriate responses to teen dating violence from service providers, the criminal justice system, teens themselves, victims, perpetrators and bystanders.

Award: Varies

Eligibility: Nonprofits with or without 501(c)(3) designation; colleges and universities; state and local governments; tribes and tribal organizations; for-profits and small businesses;

PRIVATE GRANTS**VIOLENCE PREVENTION****A Brighter Future for Children and Youth**

General Board of Global Ministries of The United Methodist Church

Program: The Women's Division of the United Methodist Church's General Board of Global Ministries offers grants for projects and programs addressing the needs of children and young people between the ages of 5 and 18 in the areas of violence prevention, anti-abuse and relationship abuse.

Award: Approximately 10% of applicants receive funding each year, with the awards averaging \$2,500.

Eligibility: Small-scale, community- and church-based programs and projects may apply for funding. Groups affiliated with national organizations, hospitals and organizations with budgets totaling more than \$3 million do not normally receive funding. New and existing projects are eligible to apply. Preference will be given to projects that significantly involve women and youth at the grassroots level, demonstrate the ability to raise additional funds from other sources, provide direct and comprehensive services to young people, promote respect for racial and ethnic diversity, and cultivate spiritual lives and values.

Program: DPMF is a Tides Foundation funding collaborative that supports strategic collaborations of local, regional or national nonprofits working to abolish the death penalty at the state and/or federal levels. Projects supported by the Fund may also focus on intermediate steps such as specific reforms to the death penalty system, moratoria on executions, or study commissions.

Award: Eight (8) awards ranging from \$40,000 to \$80,000 each year for 2 years

Program: This fellowship introduces the students to issues and challenges affecting philanthropy, social enterprise, nonprofit organizations and other people/organizations in the social sector. The Hearst Fellow will perform research, writing, logistical, and administrative support for PSI's leadership initiatives, public programs, and meetings.

Award: Fellowship grant of \$2,000

Eligibility: A continuing graduate or undergraduate student from an underrepresented community of color with a demonstrated interest or experience in nonprofit organizations, philanthropy, and the social sector, excellent research and writing skills, demonstrated financial need and US citizenship or US permanent residency
