Preventing Sexual Violence Perpetration Targeting Modifiable Risk Factors (U01)

Centers for Disease Control and Prevention,
National Center for Injury Prevention and Control

Program: The purpose of this program is to conduct an evaluation of a primary prevention strategy designed to reduce risk for perpetration of sexual violence. This strategy should target modifiable contextual factors either alone or in combination with individual risk factors that have strong empirical support for their relevance to perpetration of sexual violence.

Award: Total available funding: \$800,000 for FY 2009; up to two awards funded at \$400,000 each

Eligibility: Public nonprofit organizations; private nonprofit organizations; for profit organizations; small, minority, and women-owned businesses; universities; colleges; research institutions; hospitals; community-based organizations; faith-based organizations; federally recognized or state-recognized Native American/Alaska Native tribal governments; Native American/Alaska Native tribally designated organizations; Alaska Native health corporations; urban Native American health organizations; tribal epidemiology centers; state and local governments or their Bona Fide Agents

RESEARCH - INJURY PREVENTION**Youth Violence Prevention through Economic, Environmental, and Policy Change (U01)**

*Centers for Disease Control and Prevention,
National Center for Injury Prevention and Control*

Program: The specific research objective of this program is to evaluate the efficacy or effectiveness of primary prevention interventions, programs, strategies, and policies that focus on the economic or environmental characteristics of communities rather than community-based interventions and strategies that focus on criminal justice responses.

Award: Total available funding: \$1 million; up to 2 awards averaging \$500,000 each

Eligibility: Public nonprofit organizations; private nonprofit organizations; for profit organizations; small, minority, and women-owned businesses; universities; colleges; research institutions; hospitals; community-based organizations; faith-based organizations; federally recognized or state-recognized Native American/Alaska Native tribal governments; Native American/Alaska Native tribally designated organizations; Alaska Native health corporations; urban Native American health organizations; tribal epidemiology centers; state and local governments or their Bona Fide Agents

Adaptations of Evidence-Based Parenting Programs to Engage Fathers in Child Maltreatment Prevention (U01)

*Centers for Disease Control and Prevention,

Program: The research objective of this grant is to help advance the knowledge of effective strategies for engaging the participation of fathers and male caregivers in evidence-based parenting program that may prevent child maltreatment.

Award: Total available funding: \$400,000; 2 awards at a maximum of \$200,000 each

Eligibility: State, county, city or township governments, special district governments, public and state controlled institutions of higher education, Native American tribal governments (Federally recognized), Native American tribal organizations (other than Federally recognized tribal governments), nonprofits with/without 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education, private institutions of higher education, for profit organizations other than small businesses, and small businesses

RESEARCH-INJURY PREVENTION**Identifying Neighborhood Level Protective and Promotive Factors for Youth Violence (U01)**

*Centers for Disease Control and Prevention,
National Center for Injury Prevention and Control*

Program: The purpose of this award is to study how neighborhood and environmental factors reduce youth violence perpetration and victimization by promoting nonviolence or buffering against known risk factors.

Award: 2 awards at \$350,000 each per year

Eligibility: Public nonprofit organizations; private nonprofit organizations; for profit organizations; small, minority, and women-owned businesses; universities; colleges; research institutions; hospitals; community-based organizations; faith-based organizations; federally recognized or state-recognized Native American/Alaska Native tribal governments; Native American/Alaska Native tribally designated organizations; Alaska Native health corporations; urban Native American health organizations; tribal epidemiology centers; state and local governments or their Bona Fide Agents

VICTIMS OF CRIME**OVC FY 09 National Day of Remembrance for Murder Victims**

US Department of Justice, Office for Victims of Crime

Program: The purpose of this program is to fund the development of a national public awareness and educational forum focusing on the rights of and issues faced by survivors of homicide victims. The forum, which will coincide with the 2009 National Day of Remembrance for Murder Victims on September 25, 2009, should involve a broad base of victim constituency groups and focus on sharing knowledge and resources so that victims and survivors may be better served.

Award: 1 award of \$150,000

Eligibility: Private nonprofit organizations, including faith-based and community-based organizations, and public agencies

CHILDREN & YOUTH**Gang Resistance Education and Training (G.R.E.A.T.) Program**
US Department of Justice, Bureau of Justice Assistance

Program: The G.R.E.A.T. Program is a school-based, law enforcement officer-instructed, classroom curriculum administered by the BJA in cooperation with the DOJ's Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms & Explosives. The program's primary objective is prevention and is intended as an immunization against delinquency, youth violence and gang membership. G.R.E.A.T. lessons focus on providing life skills to students to help them avoid engaging in delinquent behavior and violence to solve problems.

Award: Awards up to \$50,000, \$100,000 or \$125,000, depending on the project level

Eligibility: Any state, local or tribal jurisdiction or law enforcement agency (including school police, housing authority police, prosecution, probation, and parole agencies possessing the power of arrest) with an active G.R.E.A.T. Program, or committed to starting a G.R.E.A.T. Program, in cooperation with a local education agency

**Gang Resistance Education and Training (G.R.E.A.T.)
Program Regional Training Centers
FY2009 Competitive Grant Announcement**
US Department of Justice, Bureau of Justice Assistance

Program: BJA is seeking five agencies, one in each G.R.E.A.T. Region, to host and operate a Regional Training Center (RTC). Each RTC will promote the G.R.E.A.T. Program by organizing, preparing for, and conducting training programs, providing technical assistance to G.R.E.A.T. agencies within their region, and disseminating G.R.E.A.T. information.

Award: 5 awards at a maximum of \$282,331 each

Eligibility: State, local, or tribal jurisdictions and their respective law enforcement agencies with an active G.R.E.A.T. Program in their community. For-profit (commercial) organizations, non-profit organizations, and institutions of higher education, with demonstrated experience in providing regional and local training and a thorough knowledge of the G.R.E.A.T. Program, may partner with a law enforcement agency with an active G.R.E.A.T. Program in their community.

LAW**Tribal Courts Assistance Program (TCAP)
FY 2009 Competitive Grant Announcement**

US Department of Justice, Bureau of Justice Assistance

Program: TCAP's goals are to provide planning grants to develop a strategy and implementation plan to establish a court; provide grants for an existing tribal court system to enhance tribal court services; and provide planning grants for tribal justice system strategies. Three categories of funding are available: Category I: Planning and implementing a single-tribe or intertribal court system; Category II: Enhancing the operation of tribal courts; and Category III: Planning and implementing tribal justice strategies.

Awards: Category I: grant maximum of \$200,000; Category II: grant maximum of \$150,000 for populations less than 5,000 and grant maximum of \$175,000 for populations of 5,000 or more; Category III: grant maximum of \$175,000

Eligibility: Federally recognized tribal governments, including Alaska Native villages and corporations and authorized intertribal consortia may apply; recipients of prior TCAP grants may only apply for Category II funding; supplemental funding is not available for recipients of FY 2007 or FY 2008 TCAP grants

Program: The Public Interest Law Foundation supports legal work in the public interest. PILF is interested in funding both innovative projects that would not otherwise be pursued without a grant and in providing gap year funding for established projects.

Award: Total available funding: \$50,000; grants usually range from \$1,000 to \$15,000

Program: The Gardner Award goes to an individual working in or with the charitable community who has advanced the common good by mobilizing and unifying people, institutions, or causes.

Award: \$10,000 and a replica of an original relief bust of John Gardner by the late sculptor Frederick Hart

Eligibility: Award recipients must show their leadership has had either national or international impact or, if at the regional level, has attracted wide recognition and imitation.

RESEARCH**Field- Initiated Grants Program***William T. Grant Foundation*

Program: The William T. Grant Foundation supports research that enhances its understanding of: (1) how settings work, how they affect youth development, and how they can be improved; and (2) when, how, and under what conditions research evidence is used in policy and practice that affect youth, and how its use can be improved. For example: How do welfare policies affect family processes and, in turn, youth's well being? The foundation's current research interests are understanding how social settings such as families, schools, peer groups, and organizations work; how they affect youth; and how they can be improved. The foundation's interests also focus on when, how, and under what conditions research evidence is used in policy and practice that affect youth, and how its use can be improved.

Award: Field-Initiated Grants usually range from \$100,000 to \$600,000 for the duration of the award. Newly initiated experiments in which settings (e.g., classrooms, schools, youth programs, etc.) are randomly assigned to condition usually have higher awards ranging up to \$1.5 million.

Eligibility: Be employed at a nonprofit institution, either in the United States or abroad (this institution must have 501(c)(3) tax-exemption), submit a project that is consistent with the Foundation's Current Research Interests, address issues that have compelling relevance for theory, policies, and/or practices affecting the settings of youth ages 8 to 25 in the United States or a vulnerable subpopulation of those youth, reflect high standards of evidence and rigorous methods, commensurate with the proposal's goals.

FELLOWSHIPS**CIVIL & HUMAN RIGHTS****2009 Human Rights Advocates Program (HRAP)**

Center for the Study for Human Rights at Columbia University

Program: The Human Rights Advocates Program is a capacity building program designed to prepare proven human rights leaders from the Global South and marginalized communities in the U.S. to participate in national and international policy debates on globalization by building their skills, knowledge, and contacts. The 2009 HRAP focuses on human rights and globalization.

Award: The 2009 program will admit approximately six participants for a four-month residency (latter half of August to mid-December 2009) at Columbia University in New York City with a structured curriculum of advocacy, networking, skills-building, and academic coursework.

Eligibility: Participants are selected on the basis of their previous work experience in human rights and globalization, commitment to the human rights field, and demonstrated ability to pursue graduate-level studies. Full-time students and government officials are not eligible. Advocates must originate from and reside in either the Global South or the United States. Fluency in English is required. Preference is given to those who have not previously had such opportunities to travel and study internationally. Advocates must secure institutional endorsement from their organizations for their participation in the program and must commit to returning to that organization upon completion of the program.
