GOVERNMENT GRANTS **LAW – MENTAL HEALTH**

Justice and Mental Health Collaboration Program FY 2009 Competitive Program (JMHCP)

US Department of Justice, Bureau of Justice Assistance

Program: The purpose of the Justice and Mental Health Collaboration Program is to increase public safety by facilitating collaboration among the criminal justice, juvenile justice, mental health treatment, and substance abuse systems to increase access to treatment for this group of offenders. Three categories of funding are available.

Award: Three funding categories: Category 1: Planning-funded up to \$50,000; Category 2: Planning & Implementation-funded up to \$250,000; Category 3: Expansion-funded up to \$200,000

Eligibility: States, units of local government, federally recognized Indian tribes, and tribal organizations

Justice and Mental Health Collaboration State-Based Capacity Building Program (CBP)

US Department of Justice, Bureau of Justice Assistance

Program: The program provides comprehensive resources and services to eligible but unfunded Justice and Mental Health Collaboration Program applicants in FY 2009. Grantees will develop and maintain an online resource center, identify model programs to serve as learning sites, assess learning sites to develop and offer additional resources to customers such as promising practices and sustainability plans, plan and host distance learning opportunities, identify and provide targeted technical assistance to up to four unfunded states to develop collaborative, strategic statewide approaches to justice and mental health programs, develop and maintain a listserv to distribute updates and information and to facilitate ongoing communication and set aside \$30,000 to support and work with national and federal partners on related projects.

Award: 1 award at \$525,000 for 12 months

Eligibility: For-profit (commercial) organizations, nonprofit organizations, faith-based and community organizations, and institutions of higher learning

Deadline: March 26, 2009

LAW – SUBSTANCE ABUSE**Indian, Alcohol and Substance Abuse Program
FY 2009 Competitive Grant Announcement**
US Department of Justice, Bureau of Justice Assistance

Program: This program provides funding and technical assistance to federally recognized tribal governments to plan, implement, or enhance tribal justice strategies to address crime issues related to alcohol and substance abuse.

Award: Category I: Strategic Implementation-up to \$300,000; Category II: Enhancement-up to \$300,000

Eligibility: Federally recognized Native American tribal governments, including eligible Alaska Native villages and corporations and authorized intertribal consortia

HEALTH**AHRQ Grant Program for Large Conference Support (R13) and (U13)**
*US Department of Health and Human Services,
Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality (AHRQ)*

Program: This program supports conferences that include plans and strategies for disseminating conference materials and products to other audiences, beyond the participants attending the event. The types of conferences eligible for support include: research development - conferences where issues or challenges in the delivery of health services are defined and a research agenda or strategy for studying them is developed; design and methodology - conferences where methodological and technical issues of major importance in the field of health services research are addressed or new designs and methodologies are developed; dissemination conferences and research training, infrastructure and career development conferences.

Award: \$100,000

Eligibility: Public or non-profit private institution, such as a university, college, or a faith-based or community-based organization, for-profit organizations for U13 applications only, unit of local or State government, unit of local Tribal government or State Tribal government

2009 Investigator Awards in Health Policy Research
Robert Wood Johnson Foundation

Program: This program supports research that takes a multidisciplinary perspective that can enhance the understanding of the complex health challenges facing the United States and fund innovative ways to address these challenges while informing the policy-making process.

Award: Approximately 10 awards at up to \$335,000 each

Eligibility: Educational institutions or 501(c)(3) nonprofit organizations located in the United States, or its territories on behalf of investigators in fields such as anthropology, business, demography, economics, engineering, ethics, genetics, health and social policy, health services research, history, journalism, law, medicine, nursing, political science, psychology, public health, science policy, social work, sociology and others who are affiliated with the applicant institution

RESEARCH – SEXUAL ASSAULT & DATING VIOLENCE
**Research and Evaluation on Sexual Violence
and Teen Dating Violence**
US Department of Justice, National Institute of Justice

Program: NIJ seeks applications for funding research to help increase women's safety and improve the justice system and related responses to sexual violence and teen dating violence. Research is sought on all aspects of the criminal justice system's response to sexual violence; the extent of the problem of teen dating violence and characteristics of abusive teen relationships; and the evaluation of teen dating violence programs, policies, and legislation. Applications addressing other areas of research on violence against women, such as intimate partner violence and stalking, will be accepted.

Award: Total available funding: \$1,500,000; 3 to 5 awards

Eligibility: States (including territories), local governments (including federally recognized Indian tribal governments that perform law enforcement functions), nonprofit and profit organizations (including tribal nonprofit and profit organizations), institutions of higher education (including tribal institutions of higher education), and certain qualified individuals

The two award categories are Neighborhood Revitalization Awards and the Special Strategy Awards. The Neighborhood Revitalization Awards recognizes exemplary collaboration between community groups and police that yields crime reduction as well as economic development outcomes. The Special Strategy Awards recognizes exemplary collaboration between community groups and police that yield significant public safety outcomes in one or more of the following areas: applied technology, aesthetics and greenspace improvement, diversity inclusion & integration, drug market disruption, gang prevention & youth safety and seniors & safety.

Award: Neighborhood Revitalization Awards: two first place monetary awards of \$25,000 each and four runner up awards of \$15,000; Special Strategy Awards: five monetary awards of \$15,000

Eligibility: Community organizations, community development corporations, police/sheriff's departments, community partnerships, Weed & Seed programs, and collaboratives comprising more than one of these elements, public agencies (including police departments and public schools) must apply in conjunction with at least one non-profit, 501(c)(3) organization that was a leading partner in the collaboration and will serve as a fiscal agent for award funds
