Sexual Assault Projects Expansion Community Developed Models

US Department of Health & Human Services, Indian Health Service

Program: The funding seeks to increase and expand the number of available sexual assault services, advocates and community collaborations available in the urban American Indian/Alaskan Native (AI/AN) communities. The goal is to improve the responsiveness of urban Indian organizations by establishing and sustaining programs that prevent sexual assault against AI/AN. The pilot sites must address the following: (1) coordinate services for urban communities to respond to local sexual assault crises, including outreach activities to: (a) coordinate accessibility of services to local Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner (SANE) programs; (b) provide local SANE programs with information on AI/AN culture and social issues; (c) assist SANE program in providing an adequate community response to AI/AN victims by establishing orientation/referral systems to support the various interventions available; (2) participate in a nationally coordinated program focusing specifically on increasing access to sexual assault prevention or treatment services for survivors and their families; (3) provide community-focused responses in the urban setting that enhance evidence-based or practice-based SA prevention or treatment services or education programming; (4) provide communities with resources to develop their own urban based community-focused programs; (5) establish baseline data in the local communities; (6) adequately document the level of need for the urban Indian community; and (7) be scaled at a level that will ensure measurable impact.

Award: \$262,000 for five awards of \$52,400 each

VIOLENCE PREVENTION*Continued***Domestic Violence Prevention Initiative (DVPI)***US Department of Health & Human Services, Indian Health Service*

Program: This program seeks to expand the number of available domestic violence services, advocates and community collaborations available in the urban American Indian/Alaskan Native (AI/AN) populations. The DVPI pilot sites must: (1) coordinate services for urban communities to respond to local domestic violence crises; (2) participate in a nationally coordinated program focusing specifically on increasing access to domestic violence prevention or treatment services for survivors and their families; (3) provide community-focused responses in the urban setting that enhances evidence-based or practice-based domestic violence prevention or treatment services or education programming; (4) provide communities with needed resources to develop their own urban-based community-focused programs; (5) establish baseline data in the local communities; (6) adequately document the level of need for the urban Indian community; and (7) be scaled at a level that will ensure measurable impact.

Award: \$262,000 for five awards of \$52,400 each

OJJDP FY 2010 Safe Start Promising Approaches Project*US Department of Justice, Office of Juvenile Justice Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP)*

Program: This project's purpose is to develop evidence-based or theory-based interventions to prevent and reduce the impact of children's exposure to violence in their homes and communities. Grantees will help communities implement collaborative and evidence-based practices for children and their families. Exposure to violence includes being a victim of violence or a witness to violence, and encompasses abuse, neglect or child maltreatment, domestic violence and community violence. Projects must address the needs of children and youth ages 0–17 who have been exposed to violence and their families. OJJDP seeks projects that embody a comprehensive and collaborative approach that uses the current knowledge base to address children's exposure to violence.

Award: 10 awards of \$250,000 each

Eligibility: Governments, institutions of higher education, public housing authorities, nonprofits and for-profits

YOUTH**Youth with Sexual Behavior Problems Program**

US Department of Justice, Office of Juvenile Justice Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP)

Program: This program will provide funding to agencies that utilize a comprehensive multidisciplinary approach in working with youth with sexual behavior problems and their child victims to provide intervention and supervision services for the offending youth and treatment services for the surviving child victim and family. There are two parts to this solicitation: Part A and Part B. Part A of this solicitation is to pilot programs designed to provide a comprehensive community-based intervention to serve youth who are identified as having sexual behavior problems and who are in pre-or post- adjudication for an inappropriate sexual behavior with a family member, co-resident, or other child with close social ties to the perpetrator. The goal of Part B of this solicitation is to develop, design, and deliver technical assistance that provides support and guidance to the sites as they implement their community-based management strategies for youth with sexual behavior problems and their victims and families.

Award: Part A: 3 awards; maximum of \$333,333 each; Part B: 1 award; maximum of \$250,000
