VIOLENCE PREVENTION

Family Violence Prevention and Services Discretionary Grant Program/National Domestic Violence Hotline

US Department of Health & Human Services, Administration for Children and Families

Program: The Hotline provides information and referral services, counseling, and assistance to victims of domestic violence, their children and other family members, and others affected by such violence to enable them to find safety and protection in crisis situations. The successful applicant will be required to provide telephonic assistance on a 24 hours-per-day, seven days-a-week basis throughout the United States, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands. To serve the wide range of expected calls effectively, the recipient must demonstrate expertise in the area of domestic violence and the delivery of services to victims of domestic violence. The staff also must understand the importance of using appropriate linkages with State and local resources to serve callers to the Hotline.

Award: 1 award for \$3.2 million

Eligibility: Non-profits with/without 501(c)(3) IRS status, other than institutions of higher education; private institutions of higher education; community- and faith- based organizations that meet eligibility requirements may apply

FY 2010 HUD Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) Policy Requirements

US Department of Housing & Urban Development (HUD)

This notice provides information about HUD's 2010 NOFA to help applicants submit successful applications. It also describes changes to HUD's policy priorities. Among these priorities are the design and construction of buildings and communities that are accessible and visitable by people with disabilities, the availability of supportive housing services and new housing construction that integrates people with disabilities into the general community. Applications that meet HUD's policy priorities in the Plan will be awarded additional points. **Appendix A contains the expected schedule for release of funding opportunities.**

YOUTH**Basic Center Program (BCP)**

*US Department of Health & Human Services,
Administration on Children, Youth, & Families*

Program: Basic Center Programs provide an alternative for runaway and homeless youth who might otherwise end up with law enforcement or in the child welfare, mental health, or juvenile justice systems. Each BCP must provide runaway and homeless youth with a safe and appropriate shelter, individual, family, and group counseling as appropriate and aftercare. Funds granted under this award may be used to establish and operate (including renovations) local BCPs that provide both residential and non-residential services for youth and their families outside of law enforcement and the child welfare, mental health, and juvenile justice systems.

Award: Total available funding: \$15.8 million; 120 awards averaging \$150,000 per budget period

Eligibility: Public entities and nonprofits

Street Outreach Program

*US Department of Health & Human Services (HHS),
Administration for Children & Families (ACF)*

Program: This program is to support outreach services designed to build relationships between grantee staff and runaway, homeless, and street youth. Street outreach programs must address the immediate needs of street youth (food, clothing, shelter, etc.) through appropriate referrals or direct interventions. Programs are to focus on improving the behavioral and physical health of street youth, providing them with employment and educational supports, and either reunifying them with family or finding alternative, safe residential placements. Outreach services also must comprehensively address the individual strengths and needs of youth as well as be gender specific.

Award: Total available funding: \$8.5 million; 85 awards averaging \$100,000 per budget period -a 10% match is required

Eligibility: States, cities, counties, public housing authorities, tribes and nonprofits

DISABILITIES**Regional Interpreter Education Centers for
Training of Interpreters for Individuals Who Are Deaf
or Hard of Hearing and Individuals Who Are Deaf-Blind**

US Department of Education, Office of Special Education & Rehabilitative Services

Program: The purpose of this grant is to establish regional interpreter training programs that will train a sufficient number of qualified interpreters to meet the communications needs of individuals who are deaf or hard of hearing and individuals who are deaf-blind.

Award: Total available funding: \$1.5 million; 5 awards of \$300,000 each

Eligibility: States and public or nonprofit agencies and organizations, including institutions of higher education

LAW ENFORCEMENT**COPS FY 2010 Application Guide:
Community Policing Developing (CPD)**

US Department of Justice, Office of Community Oriented Policing Services

Program: The 2010 CPD grant program has been established to fund projects related to one of the following topic areas: homeland security; recruitment and hiring; offender re-entry and alternatives to incarceration; ethics and integrity; drugs; urban violence; children exposed to violence; school based policing; tribal policing; and an open topic area for the submission of proposals focused on other topics. Applicants are to identify the specific goals that they hope to achieve in one or more of the following categories: developing knowledge, increasing awareness, increasing skills and abilities, increasing practice, and/or institutionalizing practice.

Award: Requests can range from a minimum of \$75,000 to a maximum of \$500,000

Eligibility: Public governmental agencies, profit and non-profit institutions, universities, community groups and faith based organizations. Proposals should be of national relevance, significantly advance the field of community policing, and demonstrate an understanding of community policing as it pertains to the application topic.

STATISTICS**National Data Archive on Child Abuse and Neglect**

*US Department of Health & Human Services,
Administration on Children, Youth, & Families*

Program: The purpose of program is to continue the operation of the National Data Archive on Child Abuse and Neglect (NDACAN) and to continue the processing and housing of high-quality data sets and related activities that facilitate the use of archived data. NDACAN is a centralized facility for the acquisition, preservation, and dissemination of machine-readable data sets relevant to the study of child maltreatment and child welfare. NDACAN currently holds more than 100 data sets.

Award: 1 award for \$675,000

Eligibility: Nonprofits with/without 501(c)(3) status, private and state controlled institutions of higher education, for profit organizations, small businesses

REFUGEE/IMMIGRANT COMMUNITY**Discretionary Funds for Projects to Establish Individual Development Account (IDA) Programs for Refugees**

US Department of Health & Human Services, Office of Refugee Resettlement (ORR)

Program: The refugee IDA Program represents an anti-poverty strategy built on asset accumulation for low-income refugee individuals and families with the goal of promoting refugee economic independence. The objectives of this program are to: encourage regular saving habits among refugees; promote refugee participation in the financial institutions of this country; promote refugee acquisition of assets to build individual, family, and community resources; increase refugee knowledge of financial and monetary topics; assist refugees in advancing their education; increase home ownership among refugees, and assist refugees in gaining access to capital. The new grantees are to accomplish these objectives by establishing programs that combine the provision of matched savings accounts with financial training and counseling.

Award: Total available funding: \$1.8 million; 8 awards averaging \$215,000 per budget period

Eligibility: Schools, governments, tribes, colleges and universities, nonprofits, public and private institutions of higher education, nonprofits with/without 501 (c)(3)

Residential Services for Unaccompanied Alien Children

US Department of Health & Human Services, Office of Refugee Resettlement (ORR),
Division of Unaccompanied Children's Services (DUCS)

Program: Shelter care services will be provided for the period beginning when ORR accepts the child for placement and custody and ending when the child is released from custody, a final disposition of the child's immigration case results in removal of the child from the United States, or the child turns 18 years of age. Shelter care and other child welfare related services in a state-licensed residential shelter care program would be provided in the least restrictive setting. This opportunity provides money to fund providers for basic shelter and/or group homes, staff secure, secure and more specialized types of care.

Award: Total available funding: \$45 million; 15 awards averaging \$2.5 million per budget period

Eligibility: Faith-based and community organizations; organizations must be appropriately licensed (at the time of submission of the application) as facilities for the provision of shelter care and other related services to dependent children

Refugee Agricultural Partnership Program

US Department of Health & Human Services, Office of Refugee Resettlement (ORR)

Program: This program is to support rural and urban farming, gardening and food systems projects that use partnerships to create income, have healthier food and better nutrition, and enhance integration into American society on the part of refugee families. A holistic approach that encompasses the elements of production, training, accessing land, financing, developing partnerships, and client culture, language and literacy are expected in applications.

Award: Total available funding: \$1 million; 12 awards averaging \$83,300 per budget period

Eligibility: Schools, governments, tribes, colleges and universities, nonprofits, private institutions of higher education, and community- and faith-based organizations

ECONOMICS**Community Services Block Grant Training (CSBG)
and Technical Assistance Program:
State Performance Management Clearinghouse**

US Department of Health & Human Services (HHS), Office of Community Services

Program: This program will fund one CSBG State Performance Management Clearinghouse (SPMC) to serve as the central gateway to information and resources, including research and evaluation products that promote evidence-based exemplary practices and communication among the CSBG Network. The core functions of the SPMC are website development and maintenance; information collection and resource management; custom T/TA services and referrals; and information dissemination. The topics covered by the SPMC include five major focus areas: 1) employment-related services; 2) asset development; 3) administrative, program, and financial operations; 4) community economic development; and 5) risk mitigation and assessment. It is expected that the SPMC will act as a repository and distribution center and operate a website that will serve as an on-line library of information and resources on the five major focus areas.

Award: 1 award for \$1,050,000

Justice Data Analysis Program Grant**

US Department of Justice, Office of Juvenile Justice Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP)

Program: This program was designed to establish a data analysis source to serve the critical information needs of the juvenile justice community and assist OJJDP in fulfilling its responsibility to disseminate vital statistical information to the field and inform juvenile justice policy and practice. The National Juvenile Justice Data Analysis Program (NJJDAP) will serve as a principal resource to provide quality data and information to juvenile justice practitioners.

Award: 1 award for \$800,000 for the initial year with possible funding for years 2-3

Eligibility: Public agencies, units of local government, public universities and colleges, and private organizations

US Department of Justice, Office of Juvenile Justice Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP)

Program: The purpose of this program is to fund activities that will support the future development of the National Internet Crimes Against Children Data System (NIDS).

Award: One award of up to \$905,000 for a project period of up to 24 months

Eligibility: Applicants are limited to state and local law enforcement agencies currently receiving ICAC Task Force Program funding. Joint applications are encouraged from an ICAC-funded agency and non-ICAC funded partners

Program: This solicitation is designed to fund grants to document and measure the effectiveness of delinquency prevention, intervention, and/or treatment programs in preventing and reducing girls' risk behavior and offending.

Award: Multiple awards ranging between \$200,000 and \$400,000

Eligibility: Public agencies, including state agencies, units of local government, public universities and colleges, and private nonprofit and for-profit organizations

Program: The Paperless Choice Challenge is a national contest that will recognize and reward paperless fundraising campaigns by nonprofit organizations. The campaigns must be successful, replicable, and demonstrate a creative use of digital tools and techniques such as email, web sites, video, social media, widgets, etc. – anything other than traditional paper-based direct-mail fundraising.

Award: A first prize of \$5,000 and an honorable mention prize of \$1,000 will be awarded in each of the following categories: Best Digital Campaign by a Small Organization (annual budget of \$1 million or less); Best Digital Campaign by a Medium Organization (annual budget of \$1 million to \$5 million); Best Digital Campaign by a Large Organization (annual budget of \$5 million or more); and Most Innovative Digital Campaign (organization of any size).
