DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

Family Violence Prevention and Services/Expanding Leadership Opportunities within the Domestic Violence Field for Members of Underrepresented Groups

*US Department of Health & Human Services,
Administration on Children, Youth, & Families*

Program: This funding opportunity will support one collaboration of technical assistance providers to develop a leadership academy and promote leadership within the domestic violence field by members of underrepresented groups. The goals of the project are to (1) build upon and enhance the professional capacities of people from underrepresented groups working in FVPSA-funded programs; (2) improve retention of people from underrepresented groups as employees and leaders within the domestic violence field; (3) provide ongoing support, mentoring, training, technical assistance and leadership development for program participants; (4) provide ongoing technical assistance, outreach and support for efforts to increase the leadership of people from underrepresented groups throughout the domestic violence field; and (5) strengthen advocacy and services provided to victims of domestic violence among underserved populations. The intent of this project is to create a training model that can be replicated and used to encourage the development of the next generation of leaders and managers for domestic violence programs.

Award: 1 award for \$500,000 per budget period; 60-month project with five 12-month budget periods

Eligibility: Nonprofit or education organizations including: Tribal organizations providing services to federally recognized Tribes or Tribal populations; nonprofit organizations with or without 501(c)(3) status; culturally specific institutes; State Domestic Violence Coalitions; Tribal coalitions; and community- and faith-based organizations.

Program: Three State Domestic Violence Coalitions, Tribal Coalitions, or other nonprofit entities with expertise in domestic violence programs and statewide capacity or capacity to conduct a project across a Tribe will be funded to expand and enhance responses to and local services available for children exposed to domestic violence across a selected State or Tribe. Each grantee will be expected to have contributed toward the Family Youth Service Bureau's research and training goals by improving responses to children and youth exposed to domestic violence across the targeted State or Tribe, providing new or enhanced services to children and youth exposed to domestic violence, and helping to develop and provide peer-to-peer technical assistance and a national dissemination plan.

Award: Total available funding: \$450,000; 3 awards averaging \$150,000 per budget period; 36-month project with three 12-month periods

Eligibility: State Domestic Violence Coalitions funded under the Family Violence Prevention and Services Act (FVPSA); Tribal Domestic Violence Coalitions with capacity to conduct a project across the Tribe; and other nonprofit entities that provide shelter or related assistance (as defined by the FVPSA), or technical assistance regarding such shelter and related services, and which have capacity to conduct a project across the targeted State or Tribe.

Basic Center Program

US Department of Health & Human Services,

Program: The Family and Youth Services Bureau (FYSB) is accepting applications for the Basic Center Program (BCP), which is authorized by the Runaway and Homeless Act to address Runaway and Homeless Youth (RHY) problems. BCPs provide an alternative for runaway and homeless youth who might otherwise end up with law enforcement or in the child welfare, mental health, or juvenile justice systems. Each BCP must provide runaway and homeless youth with a safe and appropriate shelter, individual, family, and group counseling as appropriate and aftercare.

Award: Total available funding: \$15,798,302; 120 awards averaging \$150,000 per budget period; 36-month project with three 12-month budget periods

Eligibility: Public and non-profit private entities and combinations of such entities are eligible

CHILDREN & YOUTH**Family Violence Prevention and Services/Technical Assistance and Resource Development to Expand Services for Children and Youth**

*US Department of Health & Human Services,
Administration on Children, Youth, & Families*

Program: This funding opportunity will support one project to gather and disseminate information on best practices and available technical assistance for programs serving children exposed to domestic violence, create new technical assistance resources where gaps have been identified, provide technical assistance and support the evaluation process for recipients of the Expanding Services for Children and Youth grants and develop future training and dissemination strategies.

Award: 1 award for \$250,000 per budget period; 36-month project with three 12-month budget periods

Eligibility: Eligible entities are private, nonprofit organizations (including faith-based organizations and FVPSA-funded State Domestic Violence Coalitions) with a documented history of successful work addressing domestic violence or children exposed to domestic violence, and the capacity to serve as a national resource provider. All applicants must have documented experience providing or demonstrated capacity to provide national-scope training and technical assistance to State and Tribal Domestic Violence Coalitions and other nonprofit entities with expertise in domestic violence.

Post Release Services for Unaccompanied Alien Children

US Department of Health & Human Services, Office of Refugee Resettlement (ORR)

Program: This program will fund providers for completing home studies or post release visits to the child and sponsor. The Division of Unaccompanied Children's Services (DUCS) provides comprehensive home studies and/or post release services for children and sponsors. A home study assesses the sponsor family unit, evaluates the potential sponsor's ability to meet the child's needs, and educates and prepares the potential sponsor for reunification with the child.

Award: Total available funding: \$3 million; 2 awards for \$1.5 million each

Eligibility: Nonprofits and for-profits

Program: The Mentoring Children of Prisoners (MCP) program supports the creation and maintenance of one-on-one mentoring relationships between children of incarcerated parents and caring, supportive adult volunteer mentors. The intent of this program is to support the establishment or expansion and operation of mentoring programs, using a network of public and private community entities, in areas with substantial numbers of children of incarcerated parents.

Award: Total available funding: \$21,500,000; 80 awards averaging \$270,000 per budget period; 36-month project with three 12-month budget periods

Eligibility: Governments (state, county, local, city or township); independent school districts; public and state-controlled institutions of higher education; Indian/Native American Tribal governments and organizations; Indian/Native American Tribally designated organizations; nonprofit organizations with or without 501(c)(3) status other than institutions of higher education; Alaska Native and Native Hawaiian serving institutions, tribally controlled colleges and universities, community- and faith-based organizations

Mentoring Children of Prisoners Statewide Projects

*US Department of Health & Human Services,
Administration on Children, Youth, & Families*

Program: The intent of this program is to support the establishment or expansion and operation of mentoring programs, using a network of public and private community entities, in states with substantial numbers of children of incarcerated parents. Also, applications are being accepted from Native American tribes and tribal entities that include one or more of the fifteen targeted states and may also include other states with high numbers of incarcerated Native Americans.

Award: Total available funding: \$15 million; 8 awards averaging \$1,875,000 per budget period; 36-month project with three 12-month budget periods

Eligibility: Governments (state, county, local, city or township, special district); independent school districts; public and state-controlled institutions of higher education; Indian/Native American Tribal governments and organizations; Indian/Native American Tribally designated organizations; nonprofit organizations with or without 501(c)(3) status other than institutions of higher education; Alaska Native and Native Hawaiian serving institutions, tribally controlled colleges and universities, community- and faith-based organizations

CHILDREN & YOUTH**National Juvenile Justice Evaluation Center**

US Department of Justice, Office of Juvenile Justice & Delinquency Prevention

Program: OJJDP seeks to establish a National Juvenile Justice Evaluation Center (NJJEC) that will advance the capacity of states, tribes, and communities to develop and implement policies, procedures, and practices that support their ability to evaluate their activities and use the findings to enhance their juvenile justice activities and programs.

Award: One award will be made for a three-year project period. The award amount for the initial year will be up to \$500,000. Based on performance and the availability of funds, supplemental awards may be made for two additional years of up to \$500,000 for each year.

Eligibility: Public agencies, including state agencies, units of local government, public universities and colleges (including tribal institutions of higher education), and private organizations (including faith-based, community, and tribal organizations).

TRAFFICKING**OVC FY 10 Enhanced Collaborative Model to Combat Human Trafficking**

US Department of Justice, Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA) and Office for Victims of Crime (OVC)

Program: This joint funding program will support an enhanced anti-human trafficking law enforcement task force and victim service model designed to identify, rescue, and assist foreign and domestic, adult and minor, victims of human trafficking within the United States. A total of six cooperative agreements are expected to be awarded: three by BJA to support law enforcement agencies to coordinate the goals, objectives and activities of the entire task force in close collaboration with the local U.S. Attorney's Office (USAO) and victim service provider partner; and three awards by OVC to support a victim service organization to coordinate the provision of a comprehensive array of culturally and linguistically appropriate services to all trafficking victims identified within the geographic area impacted by the task force.

Award: Total available funding: \$3 million; 6 awards at \$500,000 each

Eligibility: State and local law enforcement agencies and nonprofit victim service organizations

HEALTH & MENTAL HEALTH**Health and Mental Health, Training and Technical Assistance Program to Refugee Serving Agencies**

US Department of Health & Human Services, Office of Refugee Resettlement (ORR)

Program: The grantee is to assist refugee-serving agencies with its main objective being the development of a curriculum and training modules for local and mainstream providers to address the needs of refugee population through training and technical assistance.

Award: 1 award for \$500,000

HIV/AIDS**FY 10 Prevention for HIV Infected Women Living in Puerto Rico**

US Department of Health & Human Services, Office on Women's Health

Program: This program seeks to prevent secondary transmission among women who practice high risk behaviors, to increase access to care for women living with HIV, to increase knowledge of protective behaviors of HIV infected women, and to reduce isolation of women living with HIV infection.

Award: 3 awards at a maximum of \$125,000 each

Eligibility: Nonprofit community- and faith-based organizations, national organizations, colleges and universities, clinics and hospitals, state and local government agencies, tribal government and tribal/urban Indian organizations

HIV/AIDS**FY 10 Leading Ladies Promoting Healthy Lifestyles and Healthy Families: An HIV/AIDS Awareness Project**

US Department of Health & Human Services, Office on Women's Health

Program: The purpose of this project is to expand the scope of the National HIV Testing Mobilization Campaign through the engagement of faith-based organizations (FBO). This project will move beyond the National HIV Testing Mobilization Campaign by targeting female spouses of pastors, female clergy, and other female leaders within faith-based communities to establish sustainable gender-specific HIV/AIDS/STD prevention and education models for women and their families. The program will focus on building capacity within faith-based organizations to incorporate reproductive health education, communication skills, stigma, condom negotiation, heterosexual risk behaviors, denial of risk, self-esteem, and messages about healthy sexual relationships in the scope of overall health and wellness.

Award: 3 to 5 awards ranging from \$150,000 to \$250,000

Eligibility: Faith-based organizations with/without 501(c)(3); community-based organizations with 501(c)(3); tribal government and tribal/urban Indian entities and organizations

FY 10 The Young Women's HIV/STD Mobilization Project: Moving Beyond the Messaging

Program: The purpose of this program is to provide accurate and comprehensive information on HIV/AIDS/STD prevention AND healthy behaviors to maintain both mental and physical health for young women ages 13 to 24. Funds for this project will be awarded to existing female adolescent/youth-girl focused community-based organizations. Funded organizations will expand the capacity of their gender-specific services to implement an HIV/STD gender responsive component to their already existing programs.

Award: 3 to 5 awards ranging from \$150,000 to \$250,000

Eligibility: National nonprofit community-based organizations, faith based organizations, and tribal/urban Indian organizations

HIV/AIDS**FY10 Health and Wellness Initiative for
Women Attending Minority Institutions**

US Department of Health & Human Services, Office on Women's Health

Program: The primary purpose of this program is to address the health of women attending minority institutions. OWH hopes to fulfill this purpose by providing support to minority institutions to develop and implement new health and wellness projects, as well as sustain existing programs and health promotion activities on campus focusing on young, minority, and college women.

Award: 8 awards averaging \$100,000 each; 5 awards to Historically Black Colleges & Universities; 2 awards to Hispanic Serving Institutions; 1 award to Tribal College and University

Eligibility: Nonprofit community- and faith-based entities, national organizations, tribal governments, tribal/urban Indian entities/organizations, minority institutions, and small businesses with previous experience collaborating with institutions of higher education and promoting minority women's health

**FY10 Project HOPE: Helping Organizations Provide Effective
HIV/AIDS Prevention for Women and Girls: A Capacity
Building and Technical Assistance Cooperative Agreement**

US Department of Health & Human Services, Office on Women's Health

Program: The purpose of this program is to provide free information, training, technical assistance and technology transfer to individuals, organizations and communities to (1) operate optimally, and (2) increase their capacity to effectively deliver evidence-based interventions and core public health strategies for HIV prevention using gender-responsive strategies for programming implementation. Capacity Building Assistance - CBA services do not include the direct delivery of HIV prevention services. Because populations disproportionately affected by HIV are also disproportionately affected by other sexually transmitted infections (STI) such as gonorrhea, chlamydia, syphilis, and herpes, CBA should encompass prevention interventions and public health best practices for these diseases and infections when appropriate.

Award: 1 or 2 awards; 1 award of \$500,000 or 2 awards of \$250,000

Eligibility: Public and private nonprofit organizations; community- and faith-based organizations; Federally recognized American Indian/Alaska Native Hawaiian tribally designated organizations
