GOVERNMENT FUNDING TRAINING/TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE

OVW Fiscal Year 2010 Technical Assistance Program *US Department of Justice, Office on Violence Against Women (OVW)*

Program: The primary purpose of the OVW TA Program is to provide direct assistance to grantees and subgrantees to enhance the success of local projects they are implementing with VAWA grant funds. This program furthers the Department's mission of advancing the goals of the Violence Against Women Act by providing OVW grantees and others in the field with the training, expertise, and problem-solving strategies they need to meet the challenges of addressing sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence and stalking.

Award: 12-month projects: maximum of \$225,000; 24-month projects: maximum of \$450,000; 36-month projects: \$900,000; 5 year projects: \$1,750,000 for the first 24 months of the project

Eligibility: Nonprofit national, tribal or statewide organizations

FY 2010 National Umbrella Cooperative Agreement Program (NUCA) *US Department of Health & Human Services, Office of Public Health & Science*

Program: The purpose of the NUCA Program is to demonstrate that partnerships between Federal agencies and national organizations can efficiently and effectively: improve access to care for targeted racial and ethnic minority populations; address social determinants of health to achieve health equity for targeted minority populations through projects of national significance; reduce youth violence (including gang violence) among targeted minority populations; increase the diversity of the health-related work force; and increase the knowledge base and enhance data availability for health disparities and health equity activities.

Award: 9 awards ranging from \$200,000 to \$300,000 per year

Eligibility: Private, nonprofit national minority-serving organization, with at least 5 years of experience working with targeted minority populations and have the capacity to address the issues within the category under which they are applying.

HEALTH**Academic-Community Partnership Conference Series (U123)**

US Department of Health & Human Services; National Institutes of Health, Eunice Kennedy Shriver National Institute of Child Health & Human Development (NICHD)

Program: This announcement solicits NICHD Cooperative Agreement Conference (U13) applications to conduct health disparities-related meetings, workshops, and symposia. The objectives of these meetings will be to establish academic-community partnerships, identify community-research priorities, and develop long-term collaborative agendas. Violence prevention is one area of focus for these partnerships.

Award: The size and duration of each award will vary. The total amount awarded and the number of awards will depend upon the number of mechanisms, quality, duration, and costs of the applications received.

Eligibility: Institutions of higher education; Hispanic-serving Institutions; Historically Black Colleges and Universities; Tribally Controlled Colleges and Universities; Alaska Native and Native Hawaiian Serving Institutions; nonprofits with/ without 501(c)(3); small businesses; for-profit organizations; state, county, city or township, special district governments; Indian/Native American Tribal governments and organizations; independent school districts; public housing authorities/Indian Housing Authorities; US territory; regional organizations; non-domestic entities; eligible agencies of the US Federal Government; community- or faith-based organizations

The Linkage to Life (L2L) Program: Rebuilding Broken Bridges for Minority Families Impacted by HIV/AIDS

US Department of Health & Human Services, Office of Minority Health

Program: This program supports family-centered integrated health and social service resource networks that coordinate and assure provision of HIV/AIDS treatment and prevention services, healthcare, social and support services, substance abuse treatment, and behavioral health services. Successful applicants must: demonstrate the effectiveness of a family-centered, integrated health and social service network approach to reducing HIV/AIDS incidence and improving health outcomes among high-risk minority populations in transition from domestic violence, incarceration, and substance abuse treatment; address the health and social barriers that may contribute to HIV/AIDS incidence among high-risk racial and ethnic minorities; and assist in the prevention of generational cycles of behavior that increases risk of future HIV infection among dependent youth

Award: \$2.84 million for 6 awards of up to \$475,000 each

HEALTH**Minority Community HIV/AIDS Partnership: Preventing Risky Behaviors Among Minority College Students**

US Department of Health & Human Services, Office of Minority Health

Program: The purpose of this program is to improve the health status, relative to HIV/AIDS, of young adults, particularly racial and ethnic minorities by eliminating disparities through local partnerships. Partners will increase awareness of risk factors for HIV/AIDS, increase counseling and testing services, influence behavior change, improve access and coordinate services amongst partners.

Award: \$1 million; 3 to 4 awards expected

Eligibility: The applicant must be an established, nonprofit national minority-serving organization with minimum of five years experience in conducting HIV/AIDS programs for minority populations. The applicant must lead a collaborative partnership arrangement with at least two institutions (one urban, one rural) of higher education, and at least two community-based health care facilities. Federally recognized American Indian Tribes and tribal organizations are eligible.

Partnerships Active in Communities to Achieve Health Equity

US Department of Health & Human Services, Office of Minority Health

Program: The purpose of this program is to address social determinants and environmental barriers to healthcare access; and increase access to and utilization of preventive health care, medical treatment, and supportive services through integrated community-based networks. The program will address at least one (but no more than three) of the following health areas: asthma, behavioral health, cancer, cardiovascular disease, diabetes, HIV/AIDS, infant mortality, obesity, substance abuse, and unintentional injuries/violence.

Award: \$4 million; 8 to 10 awards expected

Eligibility: The applicant must be a private nonprofit, community-based, minority-serving organization with a minimum of 5 years experience providing health, human, or social services. The applicant will serve as the lead agency for the project, and will represent a Community-Based Network of at least 3 partners including: a community-based minority serving organization, a local social service organization, and a Federally Qualified Health Center.

HEALTH**Support for Pregnant and Parenting Teens and Women**

US Department of Health & Human Services, Office of Adolescent Health (OAH)

Program: Grants will be awarded to develop and implement programs to assist pregnant and parenting teens and women. States may propose to use grant funds to carry out any or all of the following activities: support for pregnant and parenting student services at institutions of higher education; support for pregnant and parenting teens at high schools and community service centers; improving services for pregnant women who are victims of domestic violence, sexual violence, sexual assault, and stalking; increasing public awareness and education.

Award: 25 awards for a maximum of \$2 million each

Eligibility: States; States must partner with nonprofits and institutions of higher education to carry out the activities

HUMAN TRAFFICKING**National Human Trafficking Hotline, Training,
and Technical Assistance Program**

US Department of Health & Human Services; Office of Refugee Resettlement

Program: The central purpose of this cooperative agreement is to increase the identification and protection of victims in the United States, provide service referrals for victims, pass on tips to law enforcement agents and provide information and training on human trafficking. The Director of ORR may give priority consideration to applications that demonstrate five or more years of experience in identifying and assisting both sex and labor trafficking victims, and three or more years of experience responding to crisis telephone calls related to human trafficking, making service referrals for trafficking victims, providing tips to law enforcement, and providing technical assistance and trainings on human trafficking.

Award: 1 award for \$800,000

Eligibility: State, county, city or township, or special district governments; independent school districts; public and state controlled institutions of higher education; Native American tribal governments and/or organizations; public housing authorities/Indian housing authorities; nonprofits having a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education; private institutions of higher education; for profit organizations other than small businesses; small businesses

PRIVATE FUNDING**POVERTY****Enterprise-based Solutions to Poverty***SEVEN Fund*

Program: This annual competition will award up to two research grants of up to \$100,000 each to support innovative original research in enterprise solutions to poverty. The RFP has four goals: 1) to expand scientific inquiry to include disciplines fundamental to a deep understanding of entrepreneurship and economic development currently unsupported by conventional grant sources; 2) to forge and maintain useful collaborations between researchers and on-the-ground actors of enterprise-based solutions to poverty; 3) to provide the public with a deeper understanding of this area and its potential implications; and 4) to find, research, and analyze role-model entrepreneurs and companies whose lesson may inspire others.

Award: 2 awards of \$100,000 each

CHILDREN/YOUTH**Fourth Annual Global Youth Social Entrepreneur Competition***Ashoka and Staples, Inc.*

Program: The global competition highlights youth-led organizations focused on social issues affecting their communities, and is part of Ashoka's Youth Venture, an initiative designed to identify and foster young entrepreneurs all over the world who are creating positive change.

Award: Eight winners will be chosen throughout the summer, and in October the grand-prize winner will be selected for their outstanding impact, innovation, and potential. All eight winners will be recognized at a TEDx conference, a national gathering of thought leaders devoted to "Ideas Worth Spreading," on November 13, 2010, in Washington, D.C. The grand-prize winning team will receive \$5,000 and the remaining winners will each receive Achievement Awards and prizes worth \$500.

Eligibility: Existing and new Youth Venture teams made up of young people between the ages of 12 and 24 whose entrepreneurial ventures are making a positive impact on communities

Program: The scope of the competition is to identify innovative projects and ideas that engage citizens to steer change and build strong communities across the United States and Canada. CommunityMatters is interested in solutions from a variety of disciplines including (but not limited to) conservation, planning, economics, politics, education, deliberative democracy and the arts, and especially encourages submission of interdisciplinary approaches. CommunityMatters has a special interest in receiving submissions from young people.

Award: Eight finalists will be selected and showcased at the CommunityMatters 2010 conference. One person representing each of the eight finalist entries will win the opportunity to attend the conference (includes conference and workshop registration, lodging, transportation, and meals). The top three finalists will win \$5,000 each.

Eligibility: Individuals and organizations located in the United States or Canada with projects beyond the conceptual stage and have demonstrated a proof of impact

Community Relations Program*Ameriprise Financial, Inc.*

Program: Ameriprise provides grants to nonprofit organizations in communities across the United States where its employees, advisors, and retirees live and work. Ameriprise directs its funding resources to specific projects that can demonstrate innovative approaches with measurable results or capacity building. The Community Relations program focuses on three priority areas: meeting basic needs (food, shelter, self-sufficiency), supporting community vitality (community development, cultural enrichment, civic leadership, disaster response and recovery, environmental awareness), and volunteer-driven causes.

Award: Minimum request amount is \$5,000

Eligibility: Nonprofit organization with 501(c)(3) IRS status or 509(a)(1,2, or 3); match the guidelines of one of the three giving priorities: meeting basic needs, supporting community vitality, volunteer-driven causes; provide all grant application requirements, including audited financial statements; provide excellent, well-managed programs and high-quality services; show measurable, demonstrated results; and must be fiscally sound

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT**Skoll Awards for Social Entrepreneurship***Skoll Foundation*

Program: The Skoll Awards for Social Entrepreneurship support social entrepreneurs whose work has the potential for large-scale influence on critical challenges of our time: tolerance and human rights, health, economic and social equity, peace and security, institutional responsibility, and environmental sustainability. The Skoll Awards provide later-stage, or mezzanine, funding, which is generally structured as a \$1 million award paid out over three years.

Award: 7 to 10 awards

Eligibility: An organization must meet all of the key criteria: demonstrating leadership by a social entrepreneur, have a well-developed theory regarding the potential for achieving equilibrium change in a critical issue area, have an innovation that has a track record of at least three years and tangible results

HEALTH**Robert Wood Johnson Foundation Health & Society Scholars***Robert Wood Johnson Foundation*

Program: This program provides two years of support to postdoctoral scholars at all stages of their careers to help build the United States' capacity to address the multiple determinants of population health through research and leadership. The program's goal is to investigate the connections among biological, genetic, behavioral, environmental, economic, and social determinants of health, and develop, evaluate, and disseminate knowledge, interventions, and policies that integrate and act on these determinants to improve health.

Award: Up to 18 scholars will be selected for two-year appointments; each will receive an annual stipend of \$89,000

Eligibility: Scholars must have completed their doctoral training by the time of entry into the program (August or September 2011) in one of a variety of fields including, but not limited to, the behavioral and social sciences, the biological and natural sciences, health professions, public policy, public health, history, demography, environmental sciences, urban planning, engineering, and ethics. Applicants must have significant research experience, connect their research interests to substantive population health concerns, and be citizens or permanent residents of the United States or its territories.

**The Doris Duke Fellowships for the
Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect**

Doris Duke Charitable Foundation, Chapin Hall at the University of Chicago

Program: The objective of this program is to identify and nurture promising leaders in child abuse prevention. Fellows will work on a variety of issues, such as designing programs that attract and retain the most vulnerable families, creating strategies that better connect public and private efforts and applying empirical evidence to improve practice and policy. The program will consist of two cohorts of 15 fellows with two-year terms. The current solicitation is for the first cohort, which will start in the fall of 2011. The second cohort will in the fall of 2012.

Award: Each fellow will receive an annual stipend of \$25,000

Eligibility: Fellows can be based at any academic institution in the United States and will be selected through an open national competition.
