## **GOVERNMENT FUNDING VIOLENCE PREVENTION**

### **Cooperative Agreement Program for the National Academic Centers of Excellence in Youth Violence Prevention (U01)**

*Centers for Disease Control and Prevention,  
National Center for Injury Prevention and Control*

**Program:** The purpose of this program is to establish National Academic Centers of Excellence in Youth Violence Prevention ("ACEs") centers, which aim to reduce youth violence in defined high-risk communities by implementing and evaluating evidence-based prevention approaches.

**Award:** \$5.2 million for four awards.

**Eligibility:** Public and private nonprofit universities and university-associated teaching hospitals

**Deadline:** Letter of Intent Deadline: November 5, 2010; Application Deadline: December 6, 2010

## **HEALTH EDUCATION**

### **State Personal Responsibility Education Program (PREP)**

*US Department of Health & Human Services, Administration for Children & Families*

**Program:** The purpose of this program is to educate youth between the ages of 10 and 19 on both abstinence and contraception for the prevention of pregnancy and sexually transmitted infections, including HIV/AIDS. Applicants are encouraged to serve youth populations that are the most high-risk or have special circumstances including youth in or aging out of foster care, homeless youth, youth with HIV/AIDS, pregnant youth who are under 21 years of age, mothers who are under 21 years of age, and youth residing in areas with high birth rates for youth.

**Award:** Total available funding: \$55,250,000; minimum award for each fiscal year: \$250,000

**Eligibility:** States and territories

**HEALTH****FY 2010 Coalition for a Healthier Community**

US Department of Health & Human Services, Office on Women's Health

**Program:** The purpose of this program is to support the implementation of evidence-based health interventions through a public health systems approach which is gender-based, cost beneficial and sustainable and that addresses a health issue identified by the community as adversely affecting the health of its women and girls. Applicants will establish an advisory committee that includes members from the coalition to develop and conduct a health assessment to identify issues in their communities that adversely impact the health of women and girls.

**Award:** 16 awards at \$100,000 each

**Eligibility:** Public or private non-profit organizations, community and faith-based organizations, national organizations, colleges and universities, hospitals, tribal and urban Native American organizations, State, county and local health departments located in the 50 United States, the 6 US affiliated Pacific Island jurisdictions, Puerto Rico and the U.S Virgin Islands; applicants are required to include at least two community-based organizations with demonstrated experiences in women's health to be a viable contributing member of the coalition activities for both phases of the cooperative agreement.

US Department of Justice, National Institute of Corrections (NIC)

**Program:** The purpose of this funding opportunity is to update the 36-hour Executive Leadership for Women in Corrections program. The award recipient will update the current training and ensure it supports the learning process, leadership styles and required competencies for executive women in corrections. The award includes responsibility for the updated **Instructional Theory into Practice** formatted curriculum, the contracting and training of NIC-approved faculty and the administration of participant expenses, including the dispersal of program acceptance letters, coordination of registration, lodging, meals and transportation.

**Award:** \$100,000

### Robert Wood Johnson Foundation Scholars in Health Policy Research: 2010-2011 Call for Applications

*Robert Wood Johnson Foundation*

**Program:** This program helps to develop a new generation of creative health policy thinkers and researchers within the disciplines of economics, political science and sociology. Each year, the program selects up to nine highly qualified individuals for two-year fellowships at one of three nationally prominent universities with the expectation that they will make important research contributions to future U.S. health policy.

**Award:** Up to 9 scholarships; scholars will receive stipends of \$89,000 each year from their university.

**Eligibility:** Recent graduates of doctoral programs in economics, political science and sociology, including junior faculty; preference is given to applicants who have not previously worked extensively in health or health policy research; must be citizens of the United States or its territories or have permanent residency status

### 2010 Open Society Fellowship

*The Open Society Institute & Soros Foundations Network*

**Program:** The Open Society Fellowship supports individuals who are developing innovative solutions to pressing open society challenges. The fellowship program seeks applicants eager to communicate original and provocative ideas to a broad audience, as well as to shape policy and inspire critical debate among activists, intellectuals, decision makers, and the public.

**Award:** Full-time fellows based in the United States will receive a stipend of \$80,000 or \$100,000, depending on work experience, seniority, and current income. Stipends will be prorated for part-time fellows. For fellows based elsewhere, appropriate adjustments will be made to reflect the cost of living in those countries. The stipend does not necessarily equal the applicant's current salary. In certain cases, fellows will receive additional financial support to enable them to meet the residency expectation. In addition to the stipend, fellows will receive a project budget. That budget may include expenses such as travel (including airfare and hotel), visa costs, part-time research assistance, conference fees and health insurance.

**Eligibility:** Fellows are selected from a diverse pool of applicants that includes journalists, activists, academics, and practitioners in a variety of fields. Applicants should possess a deep understanding of their chosen subject area and a track record of professional accomplishment.

## ***VIOLENCE PREVENTION***

### **Peaceful Pathways: Reducing Exposure to Violence in Underserved Communities**

*Robert Wood Johnson Foundation Local Funding Partnerships*

**Program:** The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation Local Funding Partnerships is seeking nominations from diversity-focused funders for projects to reduce violence in traditionally underserved communities that are defined by race, ethnicity, tribe, gender, sexual identity or rural/frontier location.

**Award:** 8 matching grants of \$50,000 to \$200,000

**Eligibility:** Applicants must be nominated by a diversity-focused funder that is principally concerned with the community to be served; projects should be planned and led by members of the specific racial, gender, tribal or other disadvantaged community to be served and must be culturally appropriate; projects must be new and work to reduce violence in the context of a specific community and use that community's strengths and assets to address threatening or violent behavior that results in emotional, psychological or physical harm; grantee is expected to work with the nominating funder; matching funds must represent new funding specifically designated to support the proposed project.

**Deadline:** Proposals may be submitted any time throughout 2010 and will be reviewed on September 1, 2010 and January 5, 2011
