Research Grants for Preventing Violence and Violence – Related Injury (R01)

Centers for Disease Control and Prevention

Program: The purposes of this program are to: build the scientific base for the prevention of violence by helping to expand and advance our understanding of the etiology and primary prevention of interpersonal and self-directed violence; encourage professionals from a wide spectrum of disciplines of epidemiology, behavioral and social sciences, medicine, biostatistics, public health, health economics, law, and criminal justice, to perform research in order to prevent violence more effectively; and encourage investigators to propose research that involves the development and testing of primary prevention strategies as well as research on methods to enhance the adoption and maintenance of effective strategies among individuals, organizations, or communities.

Award: 5 awards of up to \$400,000 per award

Eligibility: Public nonprofit organizations; private nonprofit organizations; for profit organizations; small, minority, and women-owned businesses; universities; colleges; research institutions; hospitals; community-based organizations; faith-based organizations; federally recognized or state-recognized American Indian/Alaska Native tribal governments; American Indian/Alaska Native tribally designated organizations; Alaska Native health corporations; urban Indian health organizations; tribal epidemiology centers; state and local governments or their Bona Fide Agents (this includes the District of Columbia, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, American Samoa, Guam, the Federated States of Micronesia, the Republic of the Marshall Islands, and the Republic of Palau); and political subdivisions of states (in consultation with states.)

Program: This funding opportunity announcement (FOA) encourages research that will build the scientific base for the prevention of unintentional injuries to children, 0 -19 years. It is meant to engage professionals from a wide spectrum of disciplines in epidemiology, community medicine, clinical pediatrics, pediatric psychology, child development, public policy, public health law, and behavioral and social sciences community medicine, clinical pediatrics, pediatric psychology, child development, public policy, public health law, and behavioral and social sciences. This FOA addresses “Healthy People 2010” priority area(s) of injury and violence prevention and the NCIPC’s research agenda, and is in alignment with NCIPC performance goal(s) to increase the capacity of injury prevention and control programs. It also supports CDC’s performance goals of prevention research involving sustainable and transferable community-based interventions.

Award: 3 awards of \$175,000

Eligibility: Public nonprofit organizations, private nonprofit organizations, for profit organizations, small minority and women-owned businesses, universities, colleges, research institutions, hospitals, community-based organizations, faith-based organizations, federally recognized or state-recognized American Indian/Alaska Native tribal governments, American Indian/Alaska Native tribally designated organizations, Alaska Native health corporations, Urban Indian health organizations, tribal epidemiology centers, state and local governments

HEALTH/SUBSTANCE ABUSE**Grants to Expand Substance Abuse Treatment Capacity in Targeted Areas of Need - Local Recovery Oriented Systems of Care**

Substance Abuse & Mental Health Services Administration

Program: This program is designed to foster the development and utilization of local recovery-oriented systems of care to address gaps in treatment capacity by supporting person-centered and self-directed approaches for substance abuse (including alcohol and drug) treatment and recovery services in communities with serious drug problems. The purpose of this program is to expand the community's ability to provide integrated and comprehensive community-based responses to a targeted, well-documented substance abuse treatment capacity problem and/or improve the quality and intensity of services. This program serves to develop local recovery-oriented systems of care that will expand and/or enhance substance abuse services and promote recovery. The local recovery-oriented system of care must include linkages between substance abuse treatment/recovery services and primary health care and mental health care services.

Award: 12 awards of up to \$400,000 per award

Eligibility: Eligible applicants are domestic public and private nonprofit entities. For example, State and local governments, federally recognized American Indian/Alaska Native Tribes and tribal organizations, urban Indian organizations, public or private universities and colleges; and community- and faith-based organizations may apply. The statutory authority for this program prohibits grants to for-profit agencies. Funding is not designed to meet Statewide treatment needs, but to meet the needs of individual communities in cities, towns, counties, and multi-county partnerships. States that apply must identify a specific city, town, county or multi-county partnership that will be the targeted geographic area of need.

HUMANITIES/MEDIA**America's Media Makers Development Grants***National Endowment for the Humanities*

Program: This grant supports projects in the humanities that explore stories, ideas, and beliefs that deepen our understanding of our lives and our world and supports the development of content and interactivity that excite, inform, and stir thoughtful reflection upon culture, identity, and history in creative and new ways. The funded projects should encourage dialogue, discussion, and civic engagement, and foster learning among people of all ages. Development grants enable media producers to collaborate with scholars to develop humanities content and format and to prepare programs for production. These grants cover a wide range of activities that include, but are not limited to, meetings and individual consultations with scholars, research, preliminary interviews, preparation of program scripts, designs for interactivity and digital distribution, and the creation of partnerships for outreach activities and public engagement with the humanities.

Award: \$75,000

Eligibility: State governments, county governments, city or township governments, special district governments, public and state controlled institutions of higher education, Native American tribal governments (Federally recognized), nonprofits having a 501(c)(3) status, other than institutions of higher education, private institutions of higher education

America's Media Makers Production Grants*National Endowment for the Humanities*

Program: Production grants support the preparation of a program for distribution. Applicants must submit a script for a radio or television program, or a prototype or storyboard for a digital media project, that demonstrates a solid command of the humanities ideas and scholarship related to a subject. These goals can be accomplished through combining a variety of program formats, forming creative collaborations among diverse institutions, and expanding the scope and reach of a project.

Award: \$1,000,000

Eligibility: State governments, County governments, City or township governments, special district governments, Public and State controlled institutions of higher education, Native American tribal governments (Federally recognized), Nonprofits having a 501(c)(3) status, other than institutions of higher education, private institutions of higher education

Deadline: January 13, 2010

The Brookdale Foundation Group

Program: The Relatives as Parents Program (RAPP) Local, Regional and State Seed Grant Initiatives for the year 2010 are designed to encourage and promote the creation or expansion of services for grandparents and other relatives who have taken on the responsibility of surrogate parenting when the biological parents are unable to do so.

Award: The program awards seed grants of \$10,000 over a two-year period in three categories: local, regional, and state public agencies.

Eligibility: Non-profit organizations in the United States, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands are welcomed to apply for either a local or regional RAPP grant. Any state public agency in any of the countries listed on the guidelines of the state RFP are eligible to apply for a state RAPP Grant. Please review the State RAPP Guidelines for other requirements.
