OVW FY 2010 Legal Assistance for Victims Grant Program

US Department of Justice, Office on Violence Against Women (OVW)

Program: This program assists in developing innovative, collaborative projects that provide quality representation to victims of domestic violence, sexual assault, dating violence, and stalking. OVW will give priority to applications that provide victims with “holistic” legal representation. Holistic representation includes representation in other legal proceedings directly related to the victim’s safety and security such as: child support, child custody, legal separation/divorce, unemployment compensation, immigration matters and/or housing.

Award: Total available funding: \$49 million; 90 awards at a maximum of \$650,000 each, the award period for these grants is 24 months

Eligibility: Domestic violence victims’ shelters, rape crisis centers and other sexual assault services programs, private nonprofits, Indian Tribal governments, Tribal organizations, or Indian Tribal Consortia, Territorial organizations, legal aid/statewide legal services, faith- and community-based legal service providers, law school clinics, bar associations.

Deadline: Letter of Intent Deadline (LOI): January 21, 2010;

Application Deadline: February 4, 2010

OVW FY 2010 STOP Violence Against Women Formula Grant Program

US Department of Justice, Office on Violence Against Women (OVW)

Program: The Services Training Officers Prosecutors-STOP Program supports community efforts to develop and strengthen effective law enforcement and prosecution strategies to combat violent crimes against women and develop and strengthen victim services in cases involving violent crimes against women. States and Territories are encouraged to develop partnerships with victim advocacy organizations, criminal justice system and community- and faith-based organizations.

Award: A base amount of \$600,000 is awarded for each State; any funds remaining are distributed according to population

Eligibility: Any State or Territory of the United States

Deadline: January 28, 2010

EDUCATION/TRAINING**OVW FY 2010 Court Training and Improvements Program**

US Department of Justice, Office on Violence Against Women (OVW)

Program: This program supports court and court-based initiatives that aim to improve civil and criminal court functions, enhance court infrastructure and improve court responses to victims of sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence and stalking.

Award: Judicial Education and Court Personnel Training Project: \$50,000, Domestic Violence Docket Project: \$100,000, Dedicated Domestic Violence Court Project: \$300,000, Sexual Assault Project: \$350,000, Specialized Domestic Violence Court Enhancement Project: \$450,000

Eligibility: Federal, State, Tribal, Territorial or local courts or court-based programs

Conference Calls: Both conference calls are scheduled for 2 pm – 4 pm Eastern Time on: January 20, 2010 and February 3, 2010

SEXUAL VIOLENCE**The Prison Rape Elimination Act (PREA)
Technical Assistance Project**

US Department of Justice, National Institute of Corrections

Program: This program provides training and education to agencies responsible for preventing, investigating, or responding to sexual assault of offenders under correctional supervision. Assistance can range from delivery of information about PREA to more complex organizational reviews, assessments and accompanying recommendations.

Award: 10 awards at a maximum of \$150,000 each

Eligibility: Public or private agency, educational institution

HEALTH**National Technical Assistance Center for Child and Adolescent Mental Health Cooperative Agreement (NTAC)**

*US Department of Health and Human Services,
Substance Abuse & Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA)*

Program: The purpose of this program is to serve as a resource and training center to increase the effectiveness of mental health services for children, adolescents and young adults and their families in States, counties, Tribes and Territories. The NTAC will provide technical assistance on systems of care development, implementation, sustainability and related policy issues to current and previously funded grantees of the Comprehensive Community Mental Health Services for Children and Their Families Program, also known as the Children's Mental Health Initiative (CMHI). The NTAC will also provide technical assistance to grantees in the State/Community Partnerships to Integrate Services for Youth and Young Adults 16-25 with Serious Mental Health Conditions and Their Families Program (Healthy Transitions Initiative).

Award: 1 award for \$3.5 million

Suicide Prevention Resource Center

Program: The purpose of this grant program is to provide prevention support, training and resources to assist organizations and individuals to develop suicide prevention programs, interventions and policies, and to establish public and private partnerships including the establishment and implementation of the National Action Alliance as a major support for the advancement of the National Strategy for Suicide Prevention (NSSP).

Award: 1 award at \$4.47 million per year for 5 years

Eligibility: Public and private nonprofit entities, including community- and faith-based organizations, institutions of higher education, governments, and tribes and tribal organizations

SUBSTANCE ABUSE**Grants to Expand Substance Abuse Treatment Capacity for Juvenile Treatment Drug Courts**

*US Department of Health & Human Services,
Substance Abuse & Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA)*

Program: The program expands and/or enhances substance abuse treatment services in "problem solving" courts which use the juvenile drug court model. The model provides: alcohol and drug treatment; recovery support services supporting substance abuse treatment, screening, assessment, case management; program coordination to juvenile defendants/offenders. Priority for the use of the funding should be given to addressing gaps in the existing continuum of treatment.

Award: Total available funding: \$8.8 million; 27 awards at a maximum of \$325,000 each

Eligibility: Existing individual Juvenile Treatment Drug Courts or their Tribal/State or local governmental proxies who may apply on their behalf

RESEARCH – CHILD ABUSE**Research on Interventions for Child Abuse and Neglect (R01)**

US Department of Health & Human Services, National Institutes of Health

Program: This research grant is soliciting applications that focus on conducting efficacy and effectiveness trials of child abuse and neglect interventions. The development of large-scale trials designed to target either or both the victims or perpetrators of child abuse and neglect, including preventive interventions is of particular interest. One of the goals is to bring together multi-disciplinary and translational perspectives encompassing basic biomedical, behavioral and social science research in mental health, physical health, public health and prevention, alcohol and substance abuse, neurology, injury, trauma and child development, to advance the knowledge of child abuse and neglect.

Award: Varies

Eligibility: Public/state controlled institution of higher education; private institution of higher education; nonprofit with/without 501(c)(3) IRS status (other than institution of higher education); small business; for-profit organization (other than small business); state government; U.S. Territory or Possession; Indian/Native American Tribal Government (federally recognized); Indian/Native American Tribal Government (other than federally recognized); Indian/Native American Tribally Designated Organization; non-domestic (non-U.S.) entity; Hispanic-serving Institution; Historically Black Colleges and Universities; Tribally Controlled Colleges and Universities; Alaska Native and Native Hawaiian Serving Institutions; regional organization; eligible agencies of the Federal government; community- or faith-based organizations; individual(s) with the skills, knowledge, and resources necessary to carry out the proposed research

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE****2010 Shelter Grant Program***Mary Kay Ash Foundation*

Program: Every October, The Mary Kay Foundation observes National Domestic Violence Awareness Month by awarding grants to deserving women's shelters. These grants provide services such as counseling, transportation vehicles, emergency shelter, food, clothing and basic needs to domestic violence survivors and their children.

Award: In 2009 the Foundation provided awards of \$20,000 each to 150 domestic violence shelters.

Eligibility: Domestic violence shelters in the United States

Deadline: Applications will be available online beginning January 2, 2010 through June 30, 2010

VIOLENCE PREVENTION/INTERVENTION**Violence Prevention and Intervention Grant***American Psychological Foundation*

Program: The purpose of this program is to encourage the transfer of psychological science with regard to violence, its prevention, and intervention strategies to applications within the community and to support the implementation of innovative community programs aimed at preventing violence.

Award: \$20,000

Eligibility: Applicants must be 501(c)(3) nonprofit organizations or educational institutions or affiliated with such an organization. Special consideration will be given to programs with a strong foundation in violence prevention and intervention research and those that have, or show promise for broad-based community support.

SOCIAL CHANGE**Gladys Marinelli Coccia Award***Youth Service America (YSA)*

Program: The first annual Gladys Marinelli Coccia Award will recognize two young female social entrepreneurs, ages 14 to 17, whose initiatives serve the common good of the community.

Award: \$2,000 for the social enterprise; travel, lodging, and registration to National Service-Learning Conference in San Jose, CA – March 24-27, 2010; awardee will serve as a spokesperson for YSA's initiatives; invitation to serve on the executive board of Girls Helping Girls; access to YSA's resources to support and expand social enterprise

Eligibility: Girls between the ages of 14 and 17 on January 1, 2010; located in the United States (special consideration will be given to nominees located in West Virginia and Metro Washington, DC); must have her own social enterprise; be supported by contributions of at least \$1,000 (cash and/or in-kind); have a business plan, including an itemized budget

Deadline: January 15, 2010

2010 Sundance Documentary Fund*Sundance Institute Documentary Film Program*

Program: The Sundance Documentary Fund supports films that focus on current human rights issues, freedom of expression, social justice, civil liberties and current critical issues. Proposals are considered in five categories: development, production/post-production, audience engagement, impact, and discretionary.

Award: Development grants – awards of up to \$20,000; Production/post-production grants – awards ranging from \$25,000 to \$75,000; Audience Engagement, Impact and Discretionary grants are available to previous funded projects or by invitation.

Eligibility: International filmmakers

Program: Independent Sector presents the Award each year to an individual whose leadership in or with the nonprofit community has been transformative and who has mobilized and unified people, institutions, or causes that improve people's lives.

Award: The award includes a gift of \$10,000 and a replica of an original bust of John Gardner by the late sculptor Frederick Hart.

Eligibility: Living American citizen, nominee's work must have national or international impact or, if at the regional level, has attracted wide recognition and imitation, nominee can not be on the Independent Sector's Board of directors, but can serve on an Independent Sector committee, nominee must be able to attend the award ceremony at Independent Sector's annual conference in Atlanta, October 20-22, 2010

HEALTH – HIV/AIDS**2010 Red Ribbon Award***UNAIDS, United Nations Development Programme on HIV/AIDS*

Program: The Red Ribbon Award honors and recognizes exceptional grassroots leadership in responding to the AIDS epidemic. The year the awards will be given to groups for leadership in responding to AIDS in one or more of the following categories: stop violence against women and girls and promote gender equality; ensure that the people living with HIV receive treatment; support HIV prevention, treatment and care programs for people who use drugs and enhance social support for those affected by HIV, including orphans and vulnerable children.

Award: Twenty-five community groups will receive awards at \$5,000 each and the opportunity to attend the XVIIIth International AIDS Conference in Vienna July 18-13, 2010. The organizations will have the ability to showcase their work. Five of the organizations will receive special recognition and an additional \$15,000.

Eligibility: Grassroots initiatives, community- and faith-based organizations, small non-governmental organizations, organizations that have been established for more than one year at the time of the application, organizations with an annual operating budget below \$300,000 US dollars

Program: The Antonio Pizzigati Prize for Software in the Public Interest annually grants a cash award for an outstanding contribution in public interest software development. In 2010 an award of \$10,000 will go to an individual who has created or led an effort to create a software product of significant value to the nonprofit sector.

Award: 1 award of \$10,000

Eligibility: Individuals who have developed an open source software product that has demonstrated impressive value to at least one nonprofit and has the potential to offer value to multiple nonprofit organizations
