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GOVERNMENT FUNDING VICTIMS OF CRIME

Helping Outreach Programs to Expand (HOPE) III *US Department of Justice, Office for Victims of Crime (OVC)*

Program: Grantees will collectively undertake a comprehensive analysis of the current state of the crime victims' field in the U.S., with each grantee conducting a critical portion of the analysis; and develop a consensus document that provides a philosophical and strategic framework for defining the role of the field in the country's response to crime and moving the field forward in the future. The final consensus document will include recommendations to OVC and the broader victims' field as well as a detailed blueprint for national demonstration project(s) focused on implementation of those recommendations.

Award: 4 cooperative agreements of \$250,000; 1 cooperative agreement of \$500,000

Eligibility: Private nonprofit organizations, institutions of higher education, tribal institutions of higher education, public agencies, tribal governments, or tribal organizations that can demonstrate knowledge and understanding of the purpose of this solicitation and the staff resources and capability to undertake the project described in this solicitation. A private nonprofit organization does not have to have 501(c)(3) status to apply for grant funding under this solicitation.

Criminal Justice Training Through the Use of Virtual Environments *US Department of Justice, National Institute of Justice (NIJ)*

Program: NIJ seeks proposals for solutions applying modeling and simulation technology to enhance criminal justice training through the use of virtual environments. Proposed solutions must identify and take into account legal, cultural, and social factors as well as policies, practices and procedures in order to create an as near to reality a training environment as possible. NIJ is willing to consider applications for the development of new technology or for the adaptation, test, or evaluation of existing technology to a criminal justice application.

Award: Awards of up to \$50,000 each

Eligibility: States, territories, local governments, federally-recognized Indian tribal governments, nonprofit and profit organizations, tribal nonprofit and profit organizations, institutions of higher education, tribal institutions of higher education, and certain qualified individuals

Task Force National Training Program***US Department of Justice,
Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP)*

Program: The ICAC Task Force Program works collaboratively as a national network of law enforcement and prosecutorial agencies that prevent, interdict, and investigate technology-facilitated child sexual exploitation and Internet crimes against children. The successful applicant will provide program support to OJJDP, the ICAC Task Forces, training providers, and other local, state, and federal law enforcement officials partnering with the ICAC Program. The six program purposes are: Entry Level and Core Training; Specialized Investigative Techniques; Digital Evidence Forensics; Prosecutor Training; Officer Wellness and Judges Training.

Award: Entry Level and Core Training (up to \$1.5 million); Specialized Investigative Techniques (up to \$1 million); Digital Evidence Forensics (up to \$1 million); Prosecutor Training (up to \$500,000); Officer Wellness (up to \$350,000); Judges Training (up to \$350,000)

Eligibility: Public agencies including state agencies, units of local government, federally-recognized Indian tribal governments, public universities and colleges, tribal institutions of higher education, private organizations, faith-based, tribal and community organizations

Program: The primary objective will be the development of specific technical assistance products to OJJDP, law enforcement, and other service providers. The deliverables include technical assistance, meeting and conference support, and information management and should be directed toward the continuation, expansion, and enhancement of DOJ's ICAC program.

Award: 1 award for \$2 million

Eligibility: Public agencies including state agencies, units of local government, federally-recognized Indian tribal governments, public universities and colleges, tribal institutions of higher education, private organizations, faith-based, tribal and community organizations

ECONOMICS**Assets for Independence Demonstration Program**

US Department of Health & Human Services, Office of Community Services

Program: The purpose of this grant program is to establish and administer Assets for Independence (AFI) projects. Grantees provide an array of supports and services to enable individuals and families with low incomes to become economically self-sufficient for the long-term. Project participants are given access to special matched savings accounts called Individual Development Accounts (IDA), in which participants save earned income for the purchase of a home, for business capitalization, or to attend higher education or training. Grantees also ensure that participants have access to financial literacy education and coaching including training on money management and consumer issues.

Award: Total available funding: \$19 million; 55 to 65 grants averaging \$350,000

Eligibility: State, county, local, city or township governments; regional organizations; independent school districts; public and state-controlled institutions of higher education; Indian/Native American Tribal governments (Federally recognized); Indian/Native American Tribal organizations (other than Federally recognized); Indian/Native American Tribally designated organizations; public/Indian housing authorities; non-profits with 501(c)(3) IRS status (other than institutions of higher education); private institutions of higher education; Hispanic-serving Institutions; Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs); Tribally Controlled Colleges and Universities (TCCUs); Alaska Native and Native Hawaiian Serving Institutions, special district governments

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT**Social Innovation Fund FY 2010**

Corporation for National and Community Service

Program: The SIF is designed to fund effective and potentially transformative portfolios of nonprofit community organizations to help them strengthen their evidence base, and replicate and expand to serve more low-income communities, identify more effective approaches to addressing critical social challenges and share this knowledge and develop the grantmaking infrastructure necessary to support the work of social innovation in communities across the United States. Nonprofit community organizations will be competitively selected by SIF intermediaries and receive sub-grants to produce measurable outcomes within a specific issue area or geographic region, evaluate their effectiveness or replicate and expand to serve more individuals.

Award: \$50 million for seven to 10 intermediary awards ranging from \$1 million to \$10 million each (a 1:1 cash match is required); sub-grantee awards will be no less than \$100,000 each (a 1:1 cash match is required)

Eligibility: Existing grant making institutions will serve as intermediaries for the funding and award it out to nonprofit community organizations through sub-grants

Program: NIJ is interested in funding projects in support of criminal justice researcher-practitioner partnerships, as well as capturing, in detail, relevant accounts of these collaborations. Such partnerships have frequently been encouraged in solicitations for research. However, this solicitation specifically aims to support activities that capture and build on these efforts and that provide opportunities for creating, enhancing, and sustaining criminal justice researcher-practitioner partnerships that will lead to better criminal justice policy, practice, and research.

Award: Total available funding: \$1 million; multiple awards

**Research and Evaluation on the Abuse, Neglect and Exploitation of
Elderly Individuals and Residents of Residential Care Facilities**

US Department of Justice, National Institute of Justice (NIJ)

Program: NIJ is seeking applications for funding research and evaluation in the areas of abuse, neglect, and exploitation of individuals over the age of 60, including individuals who reside either in the community or in residential care facilities. For the purposes of the program, the term "abuse" includes physical abuse (including medication abuse), sexual abuse, psychological abuse, abandonment and isolation, neglect or financial or fiduciary abuse. Included in the priority research areas are studies that identify and explore forensic markers of physical abuse, sexual abuse, and neglect among the elderly. The term "residential care facility" includes nursing homes; assisted living facilities; adult family care homes; adult care facilities for people with developmental, cognitive or physical disabilities; and other residential facilities that provide services to persons who are elderly, have disabilities, or have long-term chronic care needs.

Award: Total available funding: \$1 million; 2 to 4 awards

Eligibility: States, territories, local governments, federally-recognized Indian tribal governments, nonprofit and profit organizations, tribal nonprofit and profit organizations, institutions of higher education, tribal institutions of higher education, and certain qualified individuals

Program: The NIJ Ph.D. Graduate Research Fellowship (GRF) program provides awards for research on crime, violence, and other criminal justice-related topics to accredited universities that support graduate study leading to research-based doctoral degrees. NIJ invests in doctoral education by supporting universities that sponsor students who demonstrate the potential to successfully complete doctoral degree programs in disciplines relevant to the mission of NIJ. Applicants sponsoring doctoral students in policy and health sciences or in an education field are eligible to apply only if the doctoral research dissertation is in an NIJ-supported discipline (i.e., social and behavioral sciences, operations technology, information and sensors research and development, and investigative and forensic sciences).

Award: Five \$25,000 grants

Eligibility: National Institute of Justice (NIJ) is authorized to make grants to degree-granting educational institutions in the United States. The institution of record must be fully accredited by one of the regional institutional accreditation agencies recognized by the U.S. Secretary of Education.
