#### Coordinated Tribal Assistance Solicitation

*US Department of Justice (DOJ), Office of Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS), Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA), Office for Victims of Crime (OVC), Office on Violence Against Women (OVW), Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP)*

**Program:** The Coordinated Tribal Assistance Solicitation (CTAS) for Fiscal Year (FY) 2010, combines DOJ's existing tribal government-specific competitive solicitations into one, and thus requires only one application from each tribe or tribal consortium.

**Award:** The 10 funding areas packaged in the solicitation include:  
1) Improve public safety and enhance community-policing capacity (Community Oriented Policing Services), \$39 million for 50-70 awards 2) Prevent and reduce alcohol and substance-abuse-related crimes (Bureau of Justice Assistance, BJA), \$10 million for 20 awards 3) Develop and enhance the operation of tribal justice systems (BJA), \$17 million for 40 awards 4) Plan, renovate or construct correctional and/or correctional alternative facilities (BJA), \$9 million for eight planning grants and eight renovation awards 5) Provide direct intervention and related assistance to victims of sexual assault (Office on Violence Against Women, OVW), \$3.5 million for 12 awards 6) Enhance responses to sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking committed against adult and adolescent Indian women and girls (OVW), \$38 million for 65 awards 7) Provide community outreach and victim assistance services to address elder abuse (Office on Victims of Crime), \$500,000 for five awards 8) Prevent and control delinquency and improve the juvenile justice system (Office of Juvenile Justice & Delinquency Prevention, OJJDP), \$10 million for 40 awards 9) Enhance accountability for delinquent behavior (OJJDP), \$1.35 million for five awards 10) Develop new demonstration projects on violence prevention and rehabilitation (OJJDP), \$6.1 million for 12 awards.

**Eligibility:** Only federally recognized Indian Tribal governments, as determined by the Secretary of the Interior, may apply. This includes Alaska Native villages and Tribal consortia consisting of two or more federally recognized Indian Tribes.

**Eligibility Exception only for Purpose Area 6: Enhance responses to violence committed against Indian women and girls (OVW—Tribal Governments Program).** Under this Purpose Area only, an organization may apply that is acting as the *authorized designee* of a federally recognized Indian Tribe.

**TRAINING****National Training and Technical Assistance (TTA) Support to the Gang Resistance Education & Training (GREAT) Program**

*US Department of Justice, Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA)*

**Program:** The GREAT Program is a school-based, law enforcement officer-instructed, classroom curriculum administered by BJA in cooperation with DOJ's Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives. The program's primary objective is to prevent delinquency, youth violence and gang membership.

**Award:** 1 award at a maximum of \$2.6 million

**Eligibility:** For-profit organizations, nonprofit organizations, faith- and community- based organizations, federally recognized Indian tribal governments institutions of higher education, institutions of higher education, and consortiums with demonstrated experience in providing logistical support to large-scale national initiatives

**Deadline:** April 22, 2010

**National Training Conference on Responding to Crime Victims with Disabilities**

*US Department of Justice, Office for Victims of Crime (OVC)*

**Program:** This OVC program seeks to ensure that crime victims with disabilities receive comprehensive, quality services and are afforded fundamental rights in the aftermath of criminal victimization and abuse, including access to the criminal justice system. The conference must provide state-of-the-art, multidisciplinary training to enhance practitioner responses to victims with disabilities and to further strategic partnerships at the local, state, and national levels to enhance victims' access to the criminal justice system and needed services and support.

**Award:** \$800,000 for one award

**Eligibility:** Nonprofit organizations that are national in scope and whose mission focuses on crime victimization or disability issues

Training and Technical Assistance Program**

*US Department of Justice, Office of Juvenile Justice & Delinquency Prevention  
(OJJDP)*

**Program:** Through this program, OJJDP seeks to identify a training provider to develop and implement training on effective responses to child victimization cases for state and local law enforcement, child protection personnel, prosecutors, medical providers, and child advocacy center professionals.

**Award:** 1 award for \$1.94 million

**Eligibility:** Public agencies, including state agencies, units of local government, federally-recognized Indian tribal governments, public universities and colleges, tribal institutions of higher education, and private nonprofit organizations including faith-based, community, and tribal organizations

**AMBER Alert National Training and Technical Assistance Program**

*US Department of Justice, Office of Juvenile Justice & Delinquency Prevention  
(OJJDP)*

**Program:** The National AMBER Alert Training and Technical Assistance Program serves to increase the nation's capacity to respond to incidents of endangered missing and abducted children. This program includes two purpose areas. Applicants must address both purpose areas in their applications. The purpose areas under this program are: National Training and Technical Assistance (\$2.65 million) and AMBER Alert Southern Border Initiative (\$500,000)

**Award:** 1 award for \$3.15 million for 1 year

**Eligibility:** Public agencies, including state agencies, units of local government, federally-recognized Indian tribal governments, public universities and colleges, tribal institutions of higher education, and private nonprofit organizations including faith-based, community, and tribal organizations

**CHILDREN****OJJDP FY 2010 ICAC Programs – Law Enforcement Strategies for Protecting Children from Commercial Sexual Exploitation**

*US Department of Justice, Office of Juvenile Justice & Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP)*

**Program:** These grants support law enforcement agencies in the development of strategies to protect children from commercial sexual exploitation, specifically youth younger than 18 years old, by: improving training and coordination activities, developing policies and procedures to identify commercial sexual exploitation victims, adopting best practices to intervene appropriately with and compassionately serve victims, including providing essential services in cases where technology is used to facilitate the exploitation of the victim.

**Award:** Total available funding: \$1.2 million; up to 4 awards with a maximum of \$300,000

**Eligibility:** Existing 61 Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task Forces and ICAC affiliate law enforcement agencies with a valid memorandum of understanding (MOU) and a letter of support from the commander of the regional/state ICAC Task Force agency.

**OJJDP FY 2010 Missing and Exploited Children Program Support**

*US Department of Justice, Office of Juvenile Justice & Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP)*

**Program:** The Missing and Exploited Children Program supports state and local law enforcement, child protection personnel, prosecutors, medical providers, and child advocacy center professionals in developing and strengthening their responses to child victimization cases. The primary objective will be the delivery of specific products to serve child protection personnel, law enforcement, prosecutors, and other stakeholders.

**Award:** 1 award for up to \$350,000

**Eligibility:** Public agencies, including state agencies, units of local government, Indian tribal governments, public universities and colleges, tribal institutions of higher education, and private nonprofit organizations including faith-based, tribal, and community organizations

**CHILDREN***Continued***VOCA Regional Children's Advocacy Centers Program***US Department of Justice, Office of Juvenile Justice & Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP)*

**Program:** The VOCA Regional Children's Advocacy Centers competitive program supports four Regional Children's Advocacy Centers (RCACs) that will work to (1) develop multidisciplinary teams, local children's advocacy center programs, and state chapter organizations that respond to child abuse and neglect; and (2) strengthen existing multidisciplinary teams, child advocacy center programs, and state chapter organizations through the delivery of training and technical assistance.

**Award:** 4 awards for up to \$1,250,000

**Eligibility:** Local public and private nonprofit children's advocacy center agencies and organizations

**MENTORING-YOUTH****National Mentoring Programs***US Department of Justice, Office of Juvenile Justice & Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP)*

**Program:** This program's goal is to reduce juvenile delinquency, drug abuse, truancy and other problem and high-risk behaviors. The funding supports national organizations that have mentoring programs ready for implementation that will strengthen and expand existing activities. OJJDP is particularly interested in programs that seek to: increase participation of mentors from underrepresented groups (e.g., Hispanic and African-American adult males); target children of single-parent families; make truancy prevention a priority in improving school attendance; and promote collaboration among national youth service organizations that support mentoring activities and community organizations committed to supporting mentoring services.

**Award:** Multiple awards will be awarded to national organizations for three years, which are required to sub-award 90% of the funds to at least 75% of States

**Eligibility:** Public agencies (including state agencies, units of local government, public school systems, universities and colleges, federally-recognized Indian tribal governments (as determined by the Secretary of the Interior and published in the *Federal Register*)), private organizations (including faith-based, tribal and community organizations), and institutions of higher education (including tribal institutions of higher learning)

**Deadline:** April 22, 2010

**Program:** This solicitation invites eligible applicants to propose evidence-based enhancements that are among these moderators of program effectiveness. The strategies include: involving the parents in activities or services; providing structured activities and programs for the mentoring matches and developing and implementing on-going training and support for mentors.

**Award:** Awards between \$200,000 and \$500,000

**Program:** The Second Chance Act Mentoring Initiative will support mentoring and other transitional services essential to reintegrating juvenile offenders into their communities.

**Award:** Up to \$625,000 per award for a project period of up to 3 years

**PREVENTION****Cooperative Agreement Program for the National Academic Centers of Excellence in Youth Violence Prevention***US Health & Human Services, Centers for Disease Control & Prevention, National Center for Injury Prevention and Control (NCIPC)*

**Program:** Grantees will establish the National Academic Centers of Excellence in Youth Violence Prevention to reduce youth violence in one defined high-risk community through the implementation and evaluation of a multifaceted, evidence-based primary prevention approach. The centers are expected to engage in reciprocally beneficial collaborations among researchers and non-governmental and governmental organizations (including the local health department) and a defined high-risk community, with the common goal of reducing youth interpersonal violence.

**Award:** \$5.2 million for four awards in FY 2010; \$2.6 million for two awards in FY 2011

**Eligibility:** Public/private nonprofit universities, colleges and university-associated teaching hospitals

**RECORD MANAGEMENT****FY2010 NICS Act Record Improvement Program (NARIP)  
for States and State Court Systems Solicitation**

*US Department of Justice, Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS)*

**Program:** NARIP is intended to improve the completeness, automation, and transmittal of records used by the NICS to state and federal systems. Such records include criminal history records, records of felony convictions, warrants, records of protective orders, convictions for misdemeanor involving domestic violence and stalking, drug arrests and convictions, records of mental health adjudications, and others, which may disqualify an individual from possessing or receiving a firearm under federal law. Helping states and state court systems to automate these records will also reduce delays for law-abiding gun purchasers.

**Award:** Maximum award of \$250,000

**Eligibility:** The NARIP applications must be submitted by (a) the agency designated by the Governor to administer the NCHIP program (b) the state or territory central administrative office or similar entity designated by statute or regulation to administer federal grant funds on behalf of the jurisdictions court system, or (c) federally recognized Indian tribal government.

**RESEARCH****Research on Technology-Facilitated Crimes Against Children**

*US Department of Justice, Office of Juvenile Justice & Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP)*

**Program:** This program will support research on technology-facilitated crimes against children to inform policy and to develop effective responses to child abduction, missing children, and children at risk for exploitation and other adverse outcomes. Areas of research that will be considered for funding include the links between online offenses and hands-on molestations and prevention strategies.

**Award:** Total available funding: \$2 million; number of awards depend upon number of applications selected for funding

**Eligibility:** Public agencies, including state agencies, units of local government, Indian tribal governments, public universities and colleges, tribal institutions of higher education, and private nonprofit organizations including faith-based, tribal, and community organizations

**RESEARCH***Continued***Research on Sentencing and Community-Based Alternatives to Incarceration***US Department of Justice, National Institute of Justice (NIJ)*

**Program:** NIJ seeks applications for funding for research on sentencing and community corrections policies and practices that promote effective and cost-efficient community-based alternatives to jail and prison without jeopardizing public safety. Priority research questions include what policies and practices promote effective and cost-efficient alternatives to incarceration for alcohol and other drug-involved offenders, including those with mental health (i.e., co-morbidity) issues; and what technological applications and protocols for assessment or monitoring support effective and cost-efficient alternatives to incarceration. The target population must include adult offenders in State, local, or Federal jurisdictions who are convicted on criminal charges and may be sentenced to jail or prison.

**Award:** Approximately \$1 million for 1 to 2 awards

**Eligibility:** States (including territories), local governments (including federally recognized Indian tribal governments as determined by the Secretary of the Interior and published in the Federal Register), nonprofit and profit organizations (including tribal nonprofit and profit organizations), institutions of higher education (including tribal institutions of higher education), and certain qualified individuals

**Deadline:** June 1, 2010
