### CHILDREN EXPOSED TO VIOLENCE

#### Public Awareness and Outreach for Victims in Underserved Communities

US Department of Justice, Office for Victims of Crime (OVC)

**Program:** The purpose is to raise the awareness within traditionally underserved populations about the needs of children exposed to violence, as well as to improve their knowledge about accessing services available to child victims. Awareness campaigns should focus on services available to child victims of violence within underserved and socially isolated populations including, but not limited to, those historically underserved due to race, socio-economic status, disability, or sexual orientation.

**Award:** 10 awards at \$100,000 each

**Eligibility:** Private nonprofit organizations, including faith-based and community-based organizations, or public agencies that can demonstrate: knowledge and understanding of children exposed to violence to be highlighted in the public awareness campaign; experience in the provision of victim services and advocacy; and staff resources and capability to carry out all activities required by the funded project

**Program:** A competitive program that will award to conduct a national scope project to promote awareness and advocacy for the rights and needs of all victims of crime; develop or improve the capacity of members of national professional, membership, and professional affiliation organizations to advance victims' rights and improve services; and to address gaps in supporting those children exposed to or victimized by violence.

**Award:** 6 awards at \$250,000 each

**CHILD SUPPORT****Special Improvement Project (SIP) – Creating Family-Centered  
Approaches to Child Support Enforcement Outcomes***US Department of Health & Human Services, Office of Child Support Enforcement*

**Program:** Projects should develop a program design to educate and involve both parents in child support enforcement (CSE) processes and coordinate referral of both parents to needed non-CSE services (such as workforce development and employment). There is growing recognition that the more both parents understand and are involved in the decisions which affect their and their children's lives, there is greater opportunity to improve CSE impacts and create healthier families. Project strategies must target unwed, low-income parents who are in need of child support assistance. Parents would be referred to a combination of services such as mediation, healthy relationship education, access and visitation, as well as other services that address the financial barriers facing both non-custodial and custodial parents.

**Award:** 4 awards at \$100,000 each

**Eligibility:** Open to all types of domestic applicants other than individuals

### **Services to Advocate for and Respond to Youth Program Call for Concept Papers**

*US Department of Justice, Office on Violence Against Women*

**Program:** These grants are for direct counseling, advocacy, legal advocacy and mental health services for youth victims of sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence and stalking; and for linguistically, culturally or community relevant services for underserved populations.

### **Teenage Pregnancy Prevention: Replication of Evidence-based Programs**

*US Department of Health & Human Services, Office of Adolescent Health*

**Program:** Funding is available for two broad program types: 1) curriculum-based programs that seek to educate young people about topics such as responsible behavior, relationships, and pregnancy prevention and 2) youth development programs that seek to reduce teenage pregnancy and a variety of risky behaviors through a broad range of approaches.

**Award:** \$75 million to fund an estimated 150 projects; awards will range from \$400,000 to \$4,000,000 per year

**CHILDREN****OJJDP FY 2010 Child Protection Programs in Tribal Communities**

*US Department of Justice,  
Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP)*

**Program:** OJJDP supports states and communities in their efforts to develop and implement effective and coordinated prevention and intervention programs and to improve the juvenile and criminal justice systems so that they protect public safety, hold offenders accountable, and provide treatment and rehabilitative services tailored to the needs of juveniles and their families. OJJDP manages the AMBER Alert and Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) programs. Under OJJDP FY 2010 Child Protection Programs in Tribal Communities, OJJDP invites applications from organizations to expand the activities and goals of these programs to protect children ages 0–17 in tribal communities.

**Award:** 1 award of up to \$850,000 with the break out of costs as: AMBER Alert-\$350,000 for up to 1 year; ICAC in Tribal Communities-\$500,000 for up to 3 years

**DOMESTIC VIOLENCE****FY 2010 Services for American Victims of Domestic Violence Abroad**

**Program:** The purpose of this program is to (1) provide a comprehensive array of timely and high-quality services to American victims of domestic violence and their dependants who are residing permanently or temporarily overseas, including military bases; (2) develop, enhance, or expand the response to American victims of domestic violence abroad; (3) develop a series of bulletins addressing the critical knowledge gaps in servicing domestic violence victims and their dependents living abroad; and (4) produce a final report about the implementation of the project, including a discussion of successes, challenges, and lessons learned, that may be disseminated through OVC to the victims' field.
