Adolescent Family Life (AFL) Demonstration Projects**

US Department of Health & Human Services, Office of Adolescent Pregnancy Programs

Program: Grantees will develop, implement and evaluate innovative interventions for pregnant adolescents ages 15 -18 and their families, as well as fathers of their children and/or male partners. For purposes of these demonstration grants, only pregnant adolescents are eligible to receive program services at the time of program entry. However, services will continue to be provided to the parenting adolescent and her child after the baby is born until the child turns one year old. Applicants should propose a multi-site intervention that compares pregnant adolescents and their families receiving standard care services, with those receiving a care intervention that enhances the core services by adding a parental, family or male involvement intervention.

Award: \$4 million for 10 awards ranging from \$400,000 to \$600,000 each

Crime Victimization Survey Redesign Solicitation***US Department of Justice, Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS)*

Program: BJS intends that the Visiting Fellow develop a modular design for the crime Incident Report questionnaire to be used in the redesigned NCVS. The Visiting Fellow would be expected to review the literature surrounding the handling of repeat victimization and work collaboratively with the BJS Program Manager and staff to develop a strategy for addressing the issue in the redesigned survey. This would include a review of the current series protocol as well as how such crimes should be included in survey estimates of crime. This work could entail reviewing what information is collected about each incident in repeat victimizations, and ways of optimizing the information collected while being mindful of the burdens on respondents, as well as the impact of repeat victimization on survey estimates.

Award: \$200,000

Eligibility: Senior-level social science researchers and/or statisticians whose work on crime-related subjects has been extensively published and who are willing to commit a substantial portion of their time over an 18-month period to undertake methodological research to enhance the bureau's capacity to redesign its National Crime Victimization Survey.

WISP, Inc.

Program: The objective of the Women's Independence Scholarship Program is to help survivors of intimate partner abuse obtain an education that will in turn offer them the chance to secure employment, personal independence and self-sufficiency. Support is available for full or part-time students interested in attending accredited programs at educational institutions.

Award: There is no set dollar amount. The average award is approximately \$2,000 per school term.

Eligibility: A woman who meets the following requirements is eligible to apply: survived intimate partner abuse and has been separated from her abuser a minimum of a year, a citizen or legal resident of the United States, has applied to or is officially accepted into an accredited course of study at a United States Institution, demonstrates a critical need for financial assistance, exhibits a strong desire and the ability to complete a training and/or academic program, has a definite plan to use the desired training to upgrade skills for career advancement, to train for a new career field, or to enter or reenter the job market, has sought services from a non-profit, domestic violence agency for a minimum of 6 consecutive months, and this agency is willing to act as sponsor
